## ROUNDING UP REDS.

In commenting on the dragnet campaign against Reds now being so successfully carried on in the United States under the direction of Attorney General Palmer, the New York Herald has this to say:

"The nation owes a debt of gratitude to A. Mitchell Palmer, Attorney General of the United States, and William J. Flynn, chief of the department's secret service force, for the extraordinarily well planned and executed round-up of 'Reds' Friday night. Call them communists, anarchists, I. W. W.'s or what one will, in the end they all come under the head of 'Reds' and all are obsessed with a single idea, the tearing down of lawful, orderly government and the setting up in its place of something they call soviet or the rule of workers, in the operation of which their own notions are somewhat vague.

"A menace to the peace and prosperity of the country for years, these pests became a positive danger to its fundamental institutions with the opportunities offered them in the industrial unrest that naturally followed the war period. They were prepared to go to any lengths to accomplish general disorder and the destruction of existing institutions. Their boldness during the last few weeks has been appalling. They have scarcely taken pains to cover up their activities and their lists of members, with copies of the vicious doctrines to which they subscribe, were found lying around loose in the places raided by the federal agents.

"With thousands of them now in custody, it is fair to assume that the worst have been captured. And now let there be no mawkish sentimentality about these rascals, no prattling of the sacred right of free speech from parlor socialists and others of that ilk! Soviet Ark No. 1 is well on the way to Esthonia and the sooner a half dozen other arks are on the way with the scum gathered in by the Department of Justice as cargo the better.

A despatch from Halifax says: "It was reported in military circles here today that one of the two companies of the Royal Canadian Regiment, headquarters here, would be transferred to Montreal on or about the 7th of January. It was stated this transfer was made necessary by lack of accommodation at Halifax." In addition to the R. C. R., the permanent force of Canada now includes the Princess Pat's Regiment. While the companies are being scattered about the country from Dan to Bersheba, no mention is being made of Fredericton. The barracks here is at present idle and it looks as if it would remain so unless somebody gets a move on.

The Mail heartily welcomes to Fredericton the members of the newly-elected York Municipal Council who are meeting today in semi-annual session. The Council is a very useful body and has much important business to transact. It is to be hoped that the members in their deliberations will be imbued with the spirit of the age and recognize the fact that York County is on the eve of greater things. The indications are that this old county is going to make greater progress in the next ten years than it has made in the last half century, and it is up to the Municipal Councillors to see to it that the sails are set to catch every favorable breeze.

Clergymen in several city pulpits on Sunday made mention of the fact that the Daily Mail was the only newspaper which was willing to help along the week of prayer movement to the extent of publishing the program without charge. The Mail did publish the notice without charge, and it hopes that it will never be so mean and narrow as to exact payment for a trifling service to such a worthy cause. The community owes much to the churches and without their presence and influence Fredericton would not be a fit place in which to live. Still, the newspapers have got to live and they cannot well afford to give as many free notices now as was the case in former years.

Five Rinks to Start on a Nova Scotia Tour—To Play Four Matches in All.

At the meeting of the Fredericton Curling Club last evening S. Dow Simons, F. P. Hatt, A. S. McFarlane, R. F. Randolph, T. A. Belmore, and T. A. Wilson were elected the skips to play against the six rinks of the St. Andrews Club who will arrive here on Wednesday, three rinks in the afternoon and three in the evening. Several communications were read from the various clubs which it was proposed to play on the tour through Nova Scotia and both Halifax Clubs stated their willingness to play five or six rinks on either the 14th or the 15th. Although subject to change it was decided to play St. Andrews on Tuesday the 13th with five rinks, the Mayflow-ers at Halifax on Wednesday the 14th and the Halifax Club on Thursday winding up the games by playing at Amherst on Friday evening. A communication was read from Oxford, N. S. stating that that club would willingly play Fredericton two rinks in the afternoon and two rinks in the evening provided that they were notified in advance as to the date. It was decided however not to accept this proposal as the game could not be arranged satisfactorily.

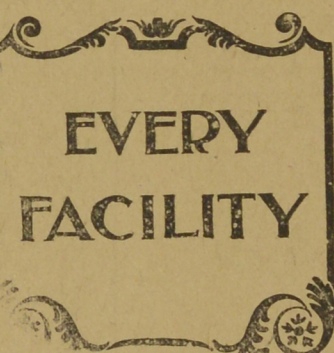
