RINK CO. AT MONCTON

**Knights of Columbus at Bathurst Incorporate for Building, etc.—New St. John Garage Company.**

### Moncton Rink Company.

Thomas C. Dobson, Coleman W. Dobson and Joseph P. Wood all of Moncton have been incorporated as Arena Limited with capital stock of \$30,000 and head office at Moncton. The company is authorized to erect and maintain rinks and dealings in sporting goods.

SUCCEEDS L. L. THERIAULT  
NOW OF EDMUNDSTON

**New Appointee U. N. B. Graduate—Was Formerly Connected With Bridge Section.**

Walter A. S. Melanson of Moncton has been appointed District Road Engineer in succession to L. L. Theriault who is now Town Manager for Edmundston. Mr. Melanson has been in the city for some days and already has taken up his duties. The district of which Mr. Theriault had charge included the North Shore Counties and Madawaska but it is probable that there will be a change, as it is contemplated to have four districts in future instead of three.

### Graduate of U. N. B.

Mr. Melanson is a graduate of the University of New Brunswick, having taken his degree in 1914. After graduation he was with the Canadian Government Railways for some time and recently has been engaged at times in the Bridge Section of the Department of Public Works of New Brunswick.

The new engineer while at the University here took a prominent part in athletics especially hockey and was captain of the U. N. B. team in his senior year.

Mr. Theriault has been engaged on his new duties for some weeks but at present is in Fredericton making arrangements for the removal of his family to Edmundston.

## TRUE BILL IS BROUGHT IN AGAINST DORCUS

TRIAL GOING ON TODAY  
BEFORE COUNTY COURT

**Prisoners from Jail Gave Evidence Against Accused—Naturalization Proceedings.**

Yesterday afternoon the grand jury brought in a true bill on the second count against James Dorcus, of Napudogan, and the prisoner now stands charged with having received stolen goods knowing them to be such. This morning Conductor Joseph Meade, Abraham Gallop and Ephraim Dixon were on the stand. The evidence obtained was practically the same as preliminary hearings of Dorcus and the other members of the party, eleven of whom are now serving six months in the County jail.

H. G. Fenety and R. B. Hanson K. C. are prosecuting for the Crown and Mr. P. J. Hughes is the counsel for the prisoner. The trial continued this afternoon.

### Naturalization Papers.

While the grand jury was out yesterday, Mr. C. D. Richards appeared and asked for naturalization papers for John Tranquilla. After His Honor Judge Wilson had examined the applicant and Mr. J. K. Pinder, M. P. P., as to his character and business ability, the request was granted. The new citizen is of Italian birth and resides at Millville, where he has a wife of Canadian birth. He is building a home for himself and bids fair to become an honored and respected member of his community.

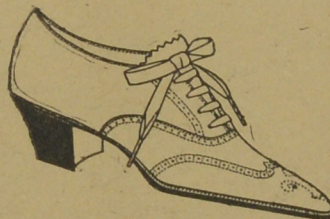
