## LIFE INSURANCE

The general slackening in business all over the United States is now being clearly reflected in the number and amount of life insurance policies written in some parts of the country, according to reports from large agencies to the Insurance Press, which makes a special effort to keep informed on contemporaneous incidents in the field it covers; but the amount of insurance taken out this year in the United States compares favorably with the record of 1919.

In its latest report a Chicago agency which has paid for a million or more dollars a month in insurance every month for eight consecutive years gives \$2,173,400 as its October production this year, against \$2,307,000 for October, 1919. During the last previous five months the managers of this agency observed "a general slowing up of new business."

A New York agency which in October, 1919, wrote \$2,605,175 of paid up business fell about a million dollars short of this record this year, but for the first ten months of this year it wrote \$24,155,313 of insurance, against \$19,326,834 in the corresponding months of 1919. Another New York agency exceeded its October, 1919, business in October, 1920 by \$150,000 almost 10 per cent. The Pittsburg agency of one company, without disclosing totals, says it has attained a certain volume of business it set for itself this year. The October, 1920, business of a Dallas, Texas agency exceeded that of a year before, and in the first ten months of this year it has written \$18,600,000, against \$10,169,000 in the corresponding months of 1919. This year's October business of a New York agency of a New England company was 20 per cent greater than that of October last year. A Los Angeles agency wrote \$1,116,038 last month, against \$835,900 in October of the previous year. For this agency in ten months of this year the new business paid for was \$11,138,877, against \$8,028,225 in the corresponding months of 1919.

It is apparent that despite the disturbance in industry and business which has been operative during a considerable part of 1920, and which must inevitably be of great influence in life insurance as well as elsewhere the amount of new business written this year will be highly gratifying. It will be of interest to find out what the lapses and cancellations of policies amount to and also to what extent leans on policies are sought.

The loss of East Elgin, Ont., which elected the farmer candidate on Monday is a serious blow to the Meighen Government. Nearly a dozen cabinet ministers, including the Premier took part in the fight and an army of paid workers was sent in to help whip the voters into line for the government. The result was that in a three cornered fight the farmer candidate won out by a majority of nearly two hundred. It is quite evident now that the change of premiership at Ottawa has not strengthened the government in the rural constituency of the country. The Farmers party is certain to hold the balance of power after the next election.

New York Herald: From London comes the news of the formation of the British Laundrymen's Research Association. It should have its fellow on this side of the ocean. It will be true research when the laundryman is able quickly to discover how the 13½ collar got in the package sent to the 250 pounder, and why a man opening a package of supposed dress shirts comes upon a linen skirt or some other garment equally useless to him.

Kansas City Times: Some persons have been heard to marvel that those United States Senators who opposed woman suffrage were nevertheless re-elected. High prices reached the lowest level on the Chicago market since 1913 this week. The price ranged from \$10.75 to \$11.40 per c.w.t. live weight. In the Kansas market there has been a break of \$12.25 from the high prices in July last.

Wheat and corn prices continue to decline in the Chicago market. December wheat is now quoted at \$1.69 and December corn at 62½ cents. Oats sold down to 52 cents a few days ago.

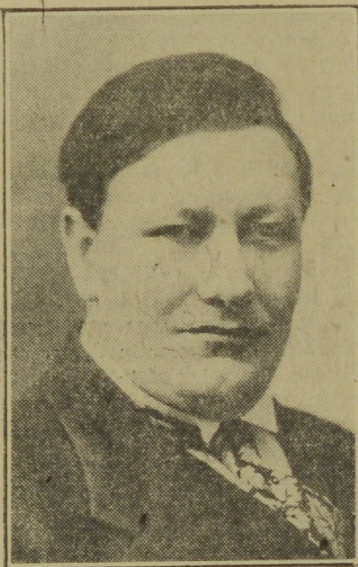

## FORMER M. P. PASSED AWAY

Toronto, Nov. 23.—Hon. Arthur Samuel Goodeve, member of the Dominion Board of Railway Commissioners died last night at the private pavilion of the Toronto General hospital. Mr. Goodeve was taken ill on November 5 at the sitting of the board here and removed to the hospital. He was born in Guelph, Ont., fifty-nine years ago, and was graduated from the college of pharmacy in Toronto. He went, west some years ago and was elected to the British Columbia legislature, becoming provincial secretary in 1903. In 1908, he was elected to the house of commons from Kootenay, became Conservative whip and resigned his seat to join the railway commission a few years later.

Mrs. Goodeve and four sons and two daughter survive him. His home is in Rossland, B. C.

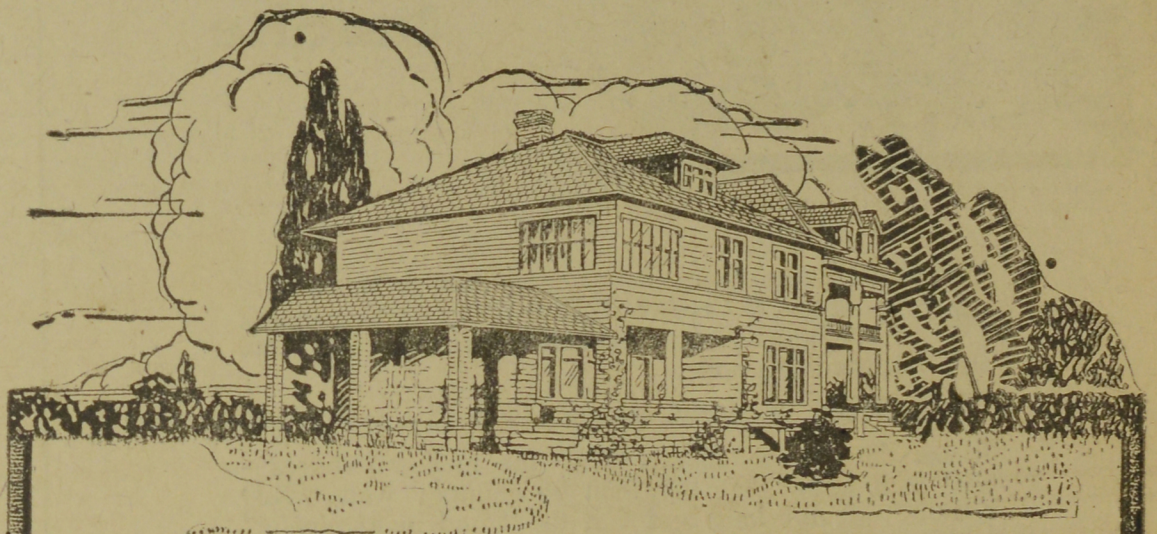
