NOT MUCH PROSPECT OF A GENERAL ELECTION SOON

The Meighen Government is Likely to Cling to Power as Long as Possible—Disappointment Felt in Government Circles Over the Defeat in East Elgin—McKelvie's Majority in Yale B. C., is Over 400—U. F. O. Men Pleased Over the Victory in East Elgin.

Ottawa, Ont., Nov. 23—Few prophesies an early election today since yesterday there is observable a recrudescence of the old arguments that it would be a great shame to have an election before the census is taken and a redistribution of seats can take place. "Redistribution by population" and "give the cities their due" will be war cries of the government party as an excuse for deferring the appeal to the people. There is the disadvantage that this will give more seats to the west, but there will be a considerable gain in the representation of western centres.

The success of Mr. W. A. Charlton in Aylmer and the determination of labor to run candidates make it evident that this will not help the government but only be deferring the evil day. Such deferring, however, sounds pleasant to the ears of those who do not expect to come back anyway. They have always the desperate hope that world events or international complications may help out. To wait as long as a parliamentary majority will permit it is evidently now the policy. In the meantime there will have to be other by-elections.

McKelvie Has 430.

Vernon, B. C., Nov. 23—With six polls yet to report this evening's early figures give a majority of 430 in the Yale by-election to J. A. McKelvie, government candidate over Colonel C. E. Edgett, Independent.

Farmers Rejoice.

Toronto, Nov. 23—The news of the election in East Elgin yesterday of U. F. O. candidate McDermand, was received with rejoicing at U. F. O. headquarters.

"A victory for those who believe in the reduction of tariff and for those who believe in democratic control," was the verdict of J. J. Morrison, secretary.

Government Disappointed.

Ottawa, Nov. 23—"The result in East Elgin is but another evidence, if such were needed, of the growing demand of the people for a change of government. It is an expression of the public disapproval of the present administration," declared Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King today.

In government circles there was evidence of some disappointment over the announced results.

The victory in Yale-Caribo had been expected here, and it was also thought recently that the government candidate in East Elgin would have carried the day.

The premier would make no statement as to the results, but one member of the cabinet remarked that "half a loaf was better than no bread."

Mr. King declared that the East Elgin result was an expression of lack of confidence. The same could also be said of the reduction of the Yale-Caribo majority to about 400 for the government supporter McKelvie.

"The people in East Elgin were voting for the Liberal and progressive principle," declared the Liberal leader, "and the result against the government was the same no matter which of the progressive candidates they

elected. Had the progressive forces in that constituency been working together the government candidate would have been swamped.

"The majority given to Mr. Charlton in Aylmer, the industrial centre of the riding, is indicative of the feeling of Ontario towns.

"They are really Liberal in sentiment, as against either Farmer or government.

"They realize that the Liberal policy of a reduced tariff on necessities of life and implements of production is helpful to the town as well as the farms."

Swift Current, Sask., Nov. 23—Speaking of the East Elgin by-election after his meeting here last night, Hon. T. A. Crerar said the result was a further indication that the people of the country were about through with the old partisan regime in politics. He predicted that not only in the west, but also in the east would there be a complete revulsion of feeling toward the old bi-party school and maintained that the politics of the country were shortly to be advanced to a higher and purer plane with a more equitable system of administration.

St. Thomas, Ont., Nov. 23—According to figures given out today by H. H. Huntley, chief returning officer in the East Elgin by-election Mr. McDermand's plurality over J. Stansell, the government candidate, has been increased to 256. Mr. McDermand's total vote is given as 3,094, Stansell's 2,838 and Charlton 2,000.

U. N. B. SENATE TO MEET AGAIN IN DECEMBER

Proposals Made re War Memorial Fund Campaign—Decision at Special Meeting.

The Senate of the University of New Brunswick continued its semi-annual session Tuesday afternoon in the Supreme Court Chamber and occupied the entire afternoon rising after six o'clock. It was announced that a special meeting of the Senate would be held in December to decide upon certain proposals made for a systematic campaign on behalf of the War Memorial Fund.

Much time was devoted this afternoon to consideration of that matter and there was lengthy discussion upon it. The proposals made will be considered by the members before the Senate meets again.

The customary conference with the professors was held and two representatives of the student-body also were heard by the Senate. These made a request for a change in regard to supplemental examinations whereby a student would be permitted to carry them over until his final year instead of losing the year in which he failed pass. No decision was given on that matter and further consideration will be given it.

Grants were voted the various academic departments and students societies. The Athletic Association was granted \$166 and the Debating Society fifty dollars.

New York, Nov. 24—It became known definitely last night that one of the first acts of the new State administration when Nathan L. Hettrick, Robert P. Brindell and others of the alleged contractor and labor rings, has not been determined.

That will be a matter for the Legislature to decide, and may depend to a great degree upon the status of the work of the Lockwood committee when the Legislature meets.
