

## JURY TRIAL FOR M'DONALD DIVORCE CASE

COURT WILL RESUME  
ON DECEMBER 13TH

Second Jury Trial Before the  
Divorce Court—Alienation  
Suit at St. John Lost  
by Husband.

When the Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes resumes here on December 13, a jury will be called to try the case of Evelyn Ward McDonald vs. John Fenwick McDonald. This is the second jury trial in the divorce court the other being in FitzRandolph vs. FitzRandolph a Fredericton case which attracted much attention. The plaintiff formerly named Keddy was residing in Halifax when the action was filed last July. The defendant is residing in St. John. They were married by Rev. W. K. Collins, Roman Catholic, March 12, 1907 and lived at St. John for seven years. Two children were born of the union. The Plaintiff in her libel mentions Mrs. Josie Black of St. John and unknown women as co-respondents.

### Recent Action.

Recently an action for the alienation of his wife's affections was brought in St. John by the defendant in his divorce action. The hearing was at St. John and the case was lost.

This action has been postponed several times not being ready for trial in July and not being reached in November. The application for a jury was made by the plaintiff. Divorce actions on the part of those married in the Roman Catholic church formerly were exceedingly rare but recently have become more numerous.

The department of agriculture, Ottawa, reports the egg situation as follows: Toronto firm, specials, 89c to 90c; extras, 70c. Montreal firm, specials scarce, 89c to 90c; extras 70c; firsts 62c; seconds, 52c to 55c. Chicago and New York unchanged.

### Failed to make Returns

It was announced by A. W. Sharp, federal inspector of taxation, Tuesday, that thirty-two citizens of St. John have been reported for failing to deliver a return of their income tax for the year 1918 as required by law. Summonses have been issued and twenty-one of the number have received notice to appear in the police court.

### Retired to Pension.

Major E. L. du Domaine of the Royal Canadian Regiment is retired to pension and transferred to the reserve of officers with the rank of lieutenant colonel from date of September 20th last. Col. du Domaine is well known in Fredericton having been on station here with the R. C. R. several times. He is a brother-in-law of J. J. F. Winslow of this city.

### Looking for a Farm.

James G. Culliton, of Portage, P. E. I., and his niece are guests at the York Hotel. Mr. Culliton, who is here looking for a farm, says that his main reason for leaving Prince Edward Island is the scarcity of school teachers. Near his home seventy-five schools had been closed for lack of teachers. He says that in Summerside bread is selling for 12 cents a loaf.

### New Provincial

Owing to continued ill-health Very Rev. P. J. Mulhall, Toronto, has resigned his office of Provincial of the English speaking Redemptorists of Canada. Father Coughlan, rector of St. Patrick's, Toronto, has been nominated Provincial in his stead by the Redemptorist General in Rome. Most Rev. Patrick Murray.

### Government Meeting.

The next meeting of the provincial government will be held in Fredericton on Wednesday evening, December 1, so Premier Foster announced here yesterday morning. It is expected that one of the most important matters to be taken up at this meeting will be the appointment of a successor to Rev. W. D. Wilson as chief inspector under the Prohibition Act. The premier said that the appointment of a commission for the wholesale distribution will not likely be made at this meeting.

### New Brunswick Case

The Supreme Court of Canada dismissed the appeal in the case of the Bathurst Lumber Company vs. Carr Harris. This case was tried before Judge McKeown without a jury at Bathurst two years ago and a verdict rendered for the defendant. Upon appealing to the Supreme Court the verdict was upheld and it is now again upheld by the Supreme Court of Canada. Messrs. G. J. Gilbert and M. G. Teed K. C.'s argued the case for the plaintiff, and Mr. P. J. Hughes of this city was counsel for the defence.

## MOOSEHEADS NOT SO NUMEROUS AS LAST YEAR

SIXTY-FOUR INCHES  
RECORD SPREAD SO FAR

American Sportsmen Fewer  
Than in Previous Seasons,  
But Have Had Good  
Luck.

The present season for big game is rapidly nearing its close and will go down in history as a year not as good as the average. The number of American sportsmen who have hunted in New Brunswick is much less than last year. The presidential election year as usual has been poor for American parties and Quebec also is getting the lion's share of the business. Sixty-Four Inches the Best. So far the best moosehead which has come into Fredericton has had a spread of sixty-four inches. This is slightly better than last season. It came from the headwaters of the Nepisiguit. What American parties have been in the province have had very good luck and have obtained good heads. In general their luck has been better than that of provincial sportsmen.

### Receipts to Date.

To date George A. Davis local taxidermist has received fifty-five deer heads for mounting and sixty mooseheads. These totals are running behind those of the 1919 season. Lately a large number of heads came in from parties which were with Guide Charles Cremin of this city who has territory on the headwaters of the Tobique and Nepisiguit Rivers. The receipts from that territory have been: A. J. Drexel Lakewood, N. J., one moose and two deer; Frederick C. Booth, New York, one moose; E. W. Kelly, Riverside, Conn., one moose, two deer; Robert Walters, one moose, one deer; Horace Pettit, Philadelphia, one moose, two deer; George C. Haas, Mt. Kisko, N. J., one moose; G. A. Harvey, Dover H. H., two deer.

H. Shelley of Fort Wayne, Ind., who was hunting with M. Phillips at Little Lake, Sunbury county, got two moose.


