MARITIME PREMIERS IN CONFERENCE AT HALIFAX

Decide to Take Concerted Action in Regard to the Matter of Western Lands---The Immigration Problem was Also Under Discussion---Delegation from the Maritime Board of Trade Given a Hearing.

Halifax, N. S., Nov. 19—Concerted action on the part of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island in the matter of western lands, transportation and immigration, was agreed upon at an all day conference of premiers and ministers of the three provinces held here today.

The members of the conference were non-committal as to what steps had been decided upon to press the question of maritime provinces' rights in the matter of western lands. In the matter of transportation an effort will be made to have the railway board hold a special sitting in Halifax before which witnesses will be examined presenting the view points of the various industries affected by the general situation arising from the present management and the increased rates.

There was considerable discussion of the immigration problem. This was brought before the conference largely by the delegation from the Maritime Board of Trade. The chairman of this delegation was H. J. Logan, K. C. of Amherst. One of the principal points raised had to do with the benefits to be derived from the joint action of the three provinces in having facilities in England for advertising the provinces and in co-operation with the federal immigration department.

With regard to western lands, there were three phases stressed in the conference when the case was discussed.

First—The western provinces of Alberta and Saskatchewan wanted control of their natural resources, which control is now in the hands of the federal government. When these provinces were formed in lieu of their resources they obtained from the dominion government a subsidy yearly which was now approximately \$562,000 for each province. This subsidy is in addition to the ordinary subsidy which is paid to every province on a per capita basis under the terms of confederation. These provinces now wanted to receive control of their natural resources and to retain this subsidy which was only payable to them in lieu of those resources.

Second—There were certain lands set aside for school purposes for both of these provinces. Through the sale of these lands the western province were able to pursue a very aggressive school policy, and they have had a source of very great wealth.

Third—Large additional areas of land were given to Manitoba, Ontario and Quebec which have placed within the use of those provinces most valuable resources both of land and mineral wealth from which they have derived vast additional revenues, placing the provinces in a very much stronger position financially than the maritimes in consequence of the restricted boundaries of the latter.

Maritime Subsidies.

It was the opinion of the conference from statements made in the west by federal ministers that the central government was determined to hand over

to the western provinces the control of their resources. It was further stated at the conference that Sir Robert Borden not long ago admitted that whenever that was done a just reason arose for increasing the subsidies to the maritime provinces. Hon. Robert Rogers had also admitted that these provinces would have a just claim under the circumstances.

Regarding the transportation problem the members of the conferences felt that the general public was entirely ignorant of the seriousness of the situation, as it affects the commercial interests of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island. It was stated that they agreed that the conditions of transportation for the maritime provinces under the present centralization methods by which control had passed to Toronto were such as to severely menace the commercial interests of the maritimes. If the increased rates were adhered to with the abolition of the differential rates which these provinces had enjoyed since confederation, numerous business concerns of the maritime provinces, it was said, would be practically prohibited from doing business by rail.
