THE NEPISIGUIT RIVER OFFERS GOOD SPORT FOR FISHERMAN

Because of being smaller the Nepisiguit River is somewhat overshadowed as a salmon fishing water in New Brunswick by the Restigouche and Miramichi rivers. But despite its size the Nepisiguit is a very prolific salmon water and each year some hefty salmon are landed on its banks, or into a boat on its surface.

A few weeks ago Arthur Snow, of Montreal, spent a week on the Nepisiguit and in that week caught a dozen salmon weighing in the aggregate, 175 pounds this not including a dozen small salmon.

Snow said that the heaviest salmon caught weighed twenty-two pounds and this is one of the very heaviest salmon caught in New Brunswick so far this season. The twenty-two pounder gave the captor a fight of nearly two hours before being landed on the bank from whence Snow was fishing at the time.

When he felt the bite, Snow had no idea that the fish was as big as it proved to be as the bite was rather light or so it seemed to him on the bank. Snow tried to land the fish on the bank without paying it and the sum total was the salmon raced down the river at a breakneck clip.

When he was brought up short at the end of the line there was a snap and Snow thought his line had broken near the hook but the warning snap was just a reminder to the fisherman to go slow in trying to hoist the big salmon to the terra firma.

On one occasion the salmon presented such a struggle Snow was tossed into the water and it was ten minutes before he was able to scramble back on the bank.

He averred the salmon pursued him several yards down river until the fish tired from this operation of towing a human being.

Finally, when the fish was exhausted from its exertions, Snow pulled it out of the water and landed it on the bank. He was much elated to find his pocket scales registered twenty-two pounds for the fish.

A Montreal lady was at the Nepisiguit salmon fishing waters this summer with a party, went alone one afternoon to tempt the luscious salmon.

She went into the middle of the river in a small dinghy and started to fish. She had a few inconsequential bites for an hour and then something happened to awaken her from her lethargy.

She had the line in the water with a very attractive fly at the hook. Owing to slowness of the salmon in taking advantage of her offerings, she was dozing in the boat and the rod was resting listlessly in her hand.

Suddenly a good sized salmon came up to hook, bit hard and then ran away with hook and line.

The lady did not have sufficient line paid out to cope with such a big salmon and when the fish was brought

up with a jerk a few yards from the boat, the woman was thrown into the water.

She was unable to swim more than a few feet and, of course, became excited and forgot to swim the few feet she had at her finger tips. She went down, and at this thrilling juncture her husband, who had been following her to the river, came on the scene and jumped into the water.

He rescued her and placed her on

the shore, which was not more than thirty feet from where she had gone down.

The most singular phase of the episode was that the fish got away with the hook, line and rod and was not captured. It must be a great impediment to the progress and to the peace of mind as well of the salmon to have the rod and line following it and to be compelled to tow rod and line everywhere it swims, and to be burdened with the hook in its jaws is likely to injure its morale.

The Nepisiguit must not be overlooked in the salmon fishing territory and there are many fishermen from Upper Canada who come from Montreal and Toronto and smaller centres every season and fish on the Nepisiguit in preference to the Restigouche and Miramichi and tributaries.

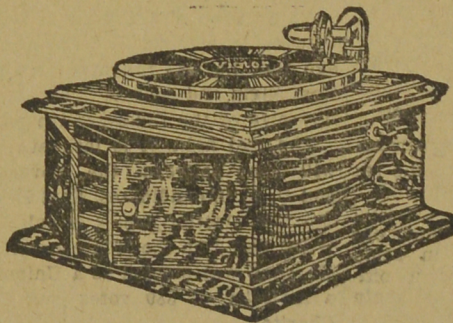
