## DOUGLAS CLARKSON PRESIDENT UNITED FARMERS' ORGANIZATION IN YORK CO.—OTHER OFFICERS

Meeting Held Tuesday at the Court House—T. W. Caldwell, M. P. for Carleton-Victoria, the Chief Speaker—Attacked Union Government, but Opposed to Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King—Other Speakers Heard.

The United Farmers of New Brunswick at a meeting held in the County Court House here Tuesday afternoon began organization for York County electing officers and directors. This meeting will be followed later by a formally called convention. In the meantime organization will be proceeded with.

### Sunbury Meeting Postponed.

On account of press of time for haying those in Sunbury County who have displayed interest in the United Farmer movement have asked that the meeting intended to be held at Oromocto Wednesday be postponed. It is probable that the speakers who will be free will address meetings in some sections of York County Wednesday night.

### Going to Nova Scotia.

A suggestion that picnics be held for organization purposes in York County during the next month brought forth that Mr. Caldwell, M. P., who was suggested as a speaker for these picnics, would be engaged on organization work in Nova Scotia during the next month.

### Subscriptions Taken.

At the close of their meeting there was a call for members to join at a charge of ten dollars each. Two hundred and forty dollars were paid in as the result. At Woodstock on Monday the sum raised in the same way was \$550.

Ex officio, Alex. Brewer, John Inch. Nelson W. Brown was suggested as director for Fredericton but declined in turn suggesting Ald. T. S. Wilkinson. The latter was not present and his nomination was not pressed.

Ex-Warden Alex Brewer who as organizing director was made a director ex officio, was nominated as president but declined. He acted as chairman of the meeting. Mr. Inch is director ex officio as secretary of the first organization.

Clarence Goodspeed was nominated as secretary but declined on account of pressure of other business.

### The Speakers.

The speakers were C. Gordon Sharp, secretary of the New Brunswick United Farmers, S. C. McKee of Ontario, T. W. Caldwell, M. P., and

John M. Pratt of Winnipeg a member of the Canadian Council of Agriculture.

### C. Gordon Sharp.

Secretary Sharp who was the first speaker of the meeting reviewed the work which already had been accomplished by the United Farmers' Stores had not done very much. They had just got away to a good start and would revolutionize business in the province. The idea behind them was different from any tried before. One great accomplishment of the United Farmers movement had been to change the popular idea of a farmer. Other classes of the population of Canada had been compelled by the movement to study the farmer as he is today. If this movement had not been inaugurated when it had, agricultural conditions would have been even worse than they are through the departure of experienced men from the soil. Because of the failure of any particular branch, the organization as a whole could not be upbraided. In some sections it was difficult to get those who could afford to give time and money to organization. The men needed were those who would decide that the movement was worth while if for nothing more than placing farming upon a new plane.

### C. S. McKee.

C. S. McKee of Ontario who followed Mr. Sharp said that he was pleased to see both men and women present at the meeting. He strongly criticized political partisanship of the past and declared that the U. F. O. had been the means of drawing the farmers together upon one platform and breaking party lines. In his own province of Ontario the United Farmers had been charged with being Grits but such was not true.

One of the primary objects of the movement was the education of the young and the beginning of a new social life. All farmers no matter of what political faith or religious creed were asked to come in and join the organization.

Discussing Federal politics Mr. McKee said that Union Government had outlived its days of usefulness. What was wanted was not a bunch of politicians, there were plenty of them, but a government of good business men who would put in order the things which had been allowed to get very much out of order.

Mr. McKee congratulated the Province of New Brunswick upon having at Ottawa so able a representative of the U. F. O. as Mr. Caldwell of Carleton-Victoria. He hoped that other similar representatives would be sent by other constituencies.

Discussing the question of cooperative marketing of livestock, Mr. McKee explained the methods followed by the stock-producers of Ontario and the excellent results obtained. After a long struggle the Cooperative in that province succeeded in getting on the Livestock Exchange. Mr. McKee described conditions as they exist in Ontario.

### T. W. Caldwell, M. P.

Mr. Caldwell, M. P., was the chief speaker and devoted some attention to the last session of the Dominion parliament. He strongly criticized the action of the government in extending credits to Greece and Roumania for the purpose of enabling manufacturing interests to keep prices up to a war level and mentioned members of parliament including Hon. C. C. Barltre and S. E. Elkin, M. P., for St. John, N. B., as benefitting in a business way from these credits. Mr. Caldwell also criticized the extension of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police beyond the confines of the Northwest and said that an expenditure of half a million dollars annually was all that was required for the maintenance of that force. Mr. Caldwell referred to the candidature of Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King leader of the Federal Opposition in an Ontario constituency and to the fact that he himself had
