

OPERATORS ARGUING BEFORE COMMISSION

REPLY TO DEMANDS OF
THE MEN PRESENTED

Department of Lands and Mines
Represented at Hearing—
Sessions May be Fin-
ished Today.

Chairman E. McG. Quirk of the Royal Commission on inquiring into coal mining conditions in the Maritime Provinces announced at noon today that the Commission this morning heard argument on the presentation of the reply of the operators to the demands of the U. M. W. as far as the Minto coal-field is concerned. C. J. Coll manager for the Minto Coal Company and W. P. Evans manager of the Rothwell Coal Company were heard.

This will be continued this afternoon when the Commission will meet again. It is possible that the Commission will be able to conclude its session this afternoon.

The case of the miners was presented before the Royal Commission at its opening session Tuesday afternoon by President Robert Baxter of Glace Bay U. M. W., District No. 26. The demands were as outlined previously in the press.

Among the operators who are present at the session are C. J. Coll, manager for the Minto Coal Co., A. D. Taylor, manager for the International Paper Company's mines, W. B. Evans, of the Rothwell Coal Co., John Henderson. The Department of Lands and Mines of New Brunswick is represented by W. E. McMullin.

Western Union Profit-Sharing

The Western Union Telegraph Company has begun the distribution of nearly \$2,000,000 to its employees everywhere as part of its profit-sharing plan. This additional remuneration represents a share of the company's earnings during the first six months of 1920. Each employee is receiving 54 per cent of his January earnings. The next payment, based on July salaries will be made in February next.

Death at Marysville

Mrs. Sarah Bubar wife of Dudley Bubar of Marysville died this morning at her home in that town. She was aged eighty years and ten months. She is survived by her husband two daughters, Mrs. James F. Gilmore and Mrs. Moses D. Dennison of Marysville, two brothers John Clark and Horatio Clark. The funeral will take place at two o'clock Thursday afternoon. Service will be conducted by Rev. J. B. Daggett. Interment will be made at the Baptist Cemetery, Marysville.

Conviction at Chatham.

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon returned last evening from Chatham where he was attending the trial of a man before Magistrate Connor, for killing a deer out of season. A conviction was secured and a fine of \$50 was imposed. Mr. Gagnon will leave for Perth tomorrow to prosecute four forest-fire cases, which will be tried there on Friday before Magistrate Hanson. One of these cases is one which has been postponed for some time, and the other three have grown out of recent violations.

Turgeon, Attorney-General for Saskatchewan, by His Grace Archbishop Mathieu during high mass at the Holy Rosary Cathedral in Regina recently. The order is conferred upon members of the Catholic Church throughout the world who distinguish themselves by moral or intellectual qualities or by a long record of useful citizenship. Not more than three other persons in the Dominion at the present time share the honor conferred on Hon. Mr. Turgeon. The latter is a son of O. Turgeon Bathurst M. P. for Gloucester.

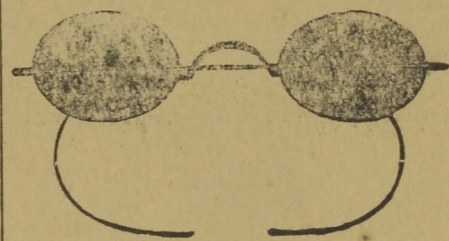
New Partnership

SUGGESTS THAT THE C.N.R. MAKE SOME CHANGES

STREET COMMITTEE
MET TUESDAY NIGHT

Wants Full Width Street for
Diversion, Also Full Sub-
way at Charlotte
Street.

The Street Committee of the City Council was in session last night for the purpose of considering the most recent proposals of the Canadian National Railways with regard to the closing and diverting of streets near the C. N. R. station and right of way which will be made on account of the building of the new double tracked bridge here. The proposals of the railway are to divert University Avenue connecting it with Waterloo Row by a fifty foot street running across property of George E. Howie and Le-Baron Bull, to close George Street, to close Charlotte street except for a subway for pedestrians, to extend Union Street across the right of way to University Avenue.

Committees' Suggestions

The committee considered the proposals. To some it was agreeable but to others it was not. The committee is against a fifty-foot street but wants a sixty-foot street to conform with other streets in the city. At George Street a subway is proposed instead of closing the street entirely. At Charlotte street a full subway for pedestrians and vehicles is proposed instead of a subway for pedestrians. The level crossing for Union Street is favored the idea being that eventually a subway will be constructed there.

The views of the Committee will be communicated to the C. N. R. authorities.

MID WEEK MARKET.

Prices Stiff and Few Farmers in Attendance—Haying Weather Too Good.

The country market was small today and prices remained high. The cause is the excellent haying weather, and the desire of most of the farmers to get their hay under cover before next wet spell. Beef was not plentiful. Corn was scarce but other vegetables abundant. Prices were as follow:—

Lamb, 20 to 30 cents per pound.
Veal, 12 to 18 cents per pound.
Potatoes \$5.00 per barrel.
Cucumbers, 1 cent each.
Gooseberries, 25 cents per box.
Blueberries, 25 cents per box.
Ripe Tomatoes, 10 to 12 cents per pound.
Peas, 30 to 35 cents per quart.
