The time in this round was 2:55.

Six thousand frenzied fans jammed and crowded the Fourth Regiment Armory to see the meet, and many of them were fair-minded enough to set forth the shouts "Take him out" after a few of Wilde's punches had jarred Russell from corner to corner. Russell never stood the ghost of a show. He was a veritable punching bag for the highly touted Englishman, who satisfied New Yorkers that his loss to Jack Sharkey several weeks ago was somewhat of a mistake. They now stand ready to back him against the best of the tiny weight division in this country.

BAT NELSON GETS BIG WAD

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 23—In his palmy fighting days when money was coming in rapidly "Bat" Nelson scrappy descendant of the Norse Kings, turned a large part of his earnings over to his old, hardheaded father for investment and safekeeping. 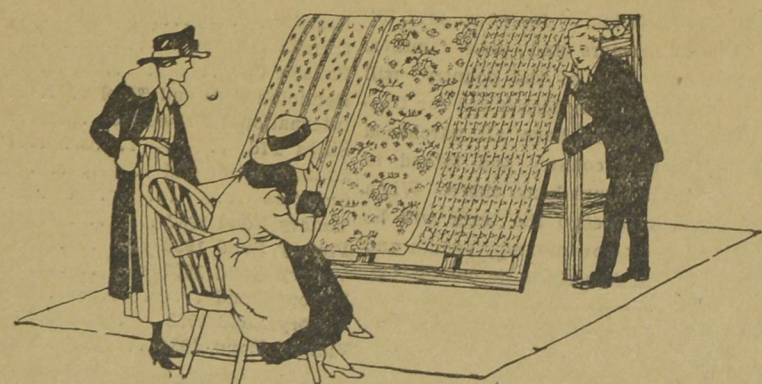
