

## KESWICK RIDGE REPORTS THREE CASES OF FLU

**SITUATION AT McADAM  
REPORTED CLEARING**

**Moncton Has Had 500 Cases—  
Conditions Have Improved  
—Bathurst Has Report-  
ed Six Cases.**

The Board of Health of York County Sub-District has received reports of two cases of influenza at Keswick Ridge and also of two new cases of the same disease at McAdam. At Peniac the situation is reported to be improved. At McAdam the same is true. Quarantine lifted from some twelve houses there.

### Provincial Reports

The Department of Health today reports that six cases of influenza are reported at Bathurst. These are the only cases reported from other parts of the province. York County Sub-District has reported sixty seven cases since the first of the outbreak. The City of Moncton has reported five hundred. No deaths occurred in Moncton, and the epidemic there has largely abated. Dr. Desmond D. M. H. O. has been sent to Sackville from which there was an unofficial report. Conditions in that town are said to be better than they were originally said to be.

### Matinee Races Postponed

On account of the storm there was no matinee racing this afternoon. Should the weather prove favorable the races will be run off Thursday or Friday.

### Death at Keswick Ridge

The death took place at Keswick Ridge Monday night of J. Harrigan after a short illness at the age of 66 years. He is survived by a wife and three sons John and William of Keswick Ridge and Arthur of Humboldt, Sask. also one sister Hannah of Boston. Service will take place Thursday afternoon at St. Dunstan's Church. Interment will be made at the Hermitage.

### Late Mrs. Maude R. Hewett

The body of Mrs. Maud R. Hewett arrived yesterday from Boston. She is survived by one son Fred Hewett of this city, two sisters Mrs. Alfred Carson of Parker's Ridge and Mrs. Thomas Jones of Fredericton; three brothers Roland Hinchey of Bloomfield, Herbert of Boiestown and James of Parker's Ridge. The funeral took place this afternoon with service by Rev. A. D. McLeod. Interment was made at Rural Cemetery.

### Wife Beat Husband

This happened however yesterday. The husband says he was attacked by his wife and as a result of a charge laid by him, Annie Ross was taken to the police station yesterday afternoon. A wedding of interest took place Monday afternoon at the Brunswick Street parsonage when Miss Bessie Beatrice Davenport daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Davenport of Devon became the bride of Walter Hubert Watts of Fredericton. The ceremony was performed by Rev. G. C. Warren. The groom is taking a course with the D. S. C. R. in Fredericton. He enlisted when seventeen years of age with the first draft from the 71st York Regt which went from Fredericton to Valcartier in August 1914. On account of his youth he was sent to Halifax and later went overseas with a draft from that city. He served three years and a half with the 2nd Pioneers on construction work in France.

### Railways are Busy

Numerous freight trains are thundering along by the countryside day and night now that the snow and ice blockade has been lifted by the big railroads after many strenuous days of ploughing and shovelling. The Canadian Pacific is not the only busy rail road this week, as the C. N. R. is moving hundreds of cars in New Brunswick and endeavoring to restore commerce and traffic to normal before a threatened storm or two gives it another setback. Nine hundred loaded cars from Moncton alone are being run to St. John and it is estimated that they are making up a score of trains. The Newcastle-Fredericton branch of the C. N. R. also has a heavy run of freight and the South Devon yards are full.

## LUMBERMEN HANDICAPPED BY STORMS

**COULD NOT CLEAR ROADS  
BEFORE CRUST FORMED**

**Hauling Roads are Blocked on  
Many Operations — R. L.  
Young's Operation  
Completed.**

Reports from York and Sunbury Counties and other parts of the central section of New Brunswick are to the effect that many lumber operators have had their business seriously interfered with by the heavy snowfalls of the month of February.

The greatest damage was done by the mild weather which was followed by cold, the combination causing a heavy crust to form. Many of the operators had no opportunity to clear out their hauling roads before the crust formed and the result is that the roads are blocked and hauling stopped.

### Not Heavy on North Shore

Recent arrivals for the North Shore say that snow in that section is not as heavy as in this vicinity, also that the heavy rain which greatly relieved conditions in the rural districts in this part of the province, did not fall in the north and that the people still are suffering from lack of water.

### Operation Finished

Ex-Coun. R. L. Young of Taymouth has completed his operation for the Miramichi Lumber Company on Taxis River. This was of some seven million feet. Ex-Coun. G. The Young operation was sufficiently advanced to escape damage from the heavy storms during February.

### Last of Chinese Laborers

St. John Globe: A little bit of international service was well performed yesterday when the members of the Soldiers' Reception Committee spent the day in meeting and greeting 1,040 Chinese war coolies who crossed the Atlantic on the S. S. Melita. Welcome cards in English and Chinese, and over a thousand golden, juicy apples, were presented to the war laborers. Their cheerful smiles, and accompanying "thank-you's" and "Merci's" testified to their appreciation of the service that was performed for them. The last train load got off about 5 o'clock in the afternoon. It is understood that this will be the last cargo of Chinese war laborers to pass through the port.

## BIG ROUND-UP BY DETECTIVES AT NAPUDOGAN

**THEFTS FROM FREIGHT  
CARS FORCED ACTION**

**Party of Prisoners Expected to  
Arrive Here Tonight—De-  
tectives There for  
Some Time.**

It is reported that detectives of the Canadian National Railways made a great round-up at Napudogan yesterday of men suspected of being implicated in the numerous thefts from freight cars on that part of the C. N. R. system. Reports are that about thirty C. N. R. employees are under arrest.

The prisoners and officers in charge were expected to arrive here today on the express from Newcastle, but did not. It is now expected that the party will come in tonight on the "whooper."

### Watching for Some Time

A number of operatives of the C. N. R. detective service have been at Napudogan and neighboring places for some time obtaining information and evidence to be used against those guilty of theft. Numerous breaks have occurred on the C. N. R. and great quantities of goods in transit have never reached their destination. This state of affairs caused a general complaint on the part of the public.

Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne and other local officers are awaiting the arrival of the party.

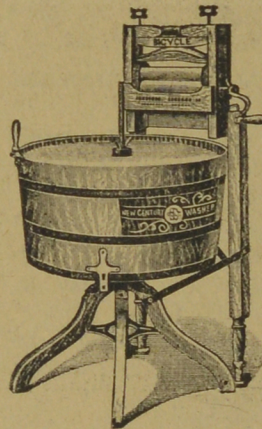
