TO BE WELL DRESSED.

To be well dressed for the street, this winter, three different types of costumes may be selected; the street suit, the dress with a fur coat, and the coat dress or practically full-length coat. The straight suit is smartest without a belt, either trimmed with fur or worn with separate furs. The materials should be of the softest, velvet-like fabrics such as duvet de laine, duvetyn, or velour. The coats should be narrow-shouldered and should hang straight to the hips, varying in length some ending between the hips and the knee, and others reaching to the knees. Although the very narrow string belt is still to be found in many suits, the smartest of all omit the belt.

Furthermore, as there is a tendency to get away from the separate waist by the use of a dress, another street costume of the winter is a dress of velour or duvetyn worn with a separate fur coat which may reach just below the hips or to the knees. The shorter coats are particularly smart for general wear. They are comfortable to walk in, and warm, without being as heavy as the three-quarter length coat.

The coat dress or long cloak is the third and distinctly ultra fashion of the winter. They are apt to take the low-belted or Moyan Age line and as a rule have a high fur collar and sometimes fur cuffs, with perhaps a bit of fur at the bottom of the coat as a band all the way around, or broad bands across the sides.

ICING HINTS.

As sugar is more plentiful and less expensive try some experiments and variations in cakes and icings.

Next time a chocolate icing is desired proceed as formerly, only use a pinch of salt and coffee to moisten instead of sugar.

Try for flavoring the icing a few drops of bitter almond and one teaspoonful of vanilla extract.

Another variation is the very thin grating rind of one lemon, combined with one teaspoonful of vanilla.

Then, again, the yellow rind of one small orange and the juice of a lemon.

Last, but not least, one teaspoonful of vanilla, half a cupful of crushed nut meats, with the sugar, moistened with milk.

## GERMANS ARE BUYING HIGH PRICED FURS

London, Dec. 2.—Despite the high price of furs and the prospect of lower prices later in the season, unprecedented sales have been reported by leading retail furriers here. Silver fox skins were sold for £250 each. A representative of the Hudson Bay Company showed a reporter a Hudson Bay sable that was priced at 1,475 guineas (\$6,000), which he said, "for the quality is cheap."

"There is a good demand for high priced coats, but, needless to say, we do not sell furs at more than £1,500 every day," he added.

A coat of sable wallaby which wears extremely well, costs 42 guineas; of mole cone, 27 guineas; of nutria, 69 guineas, and of real kolinsky, 339 guineas. Chinchilla wraps priced at about £500 have been selling well, and capes and ties of wolf, bear, marten and blue kit fox are popular.

Hudson Bay Company sales of musquash revealed a drop of 10s. in price since last March, while silver fox show an advance of 25 per cent.

One of the significant features of the fur sales here recently was the reappearance of German buyers.

"The Germans seem to have plenty of money and are taking large quantities of furs, as they did years ago," a prominent broker said.
