## FIFTEEN CASES ON THE DOCKET FOR DIVORCE COURT WHICH WILL SIT ON TUESDAY NEXT

Four Cases are Defended—Five Remanets from July Term—

One Will Not be Heard Until January—Local Interest in Some of the Cases—In But One Case is a Returned Soldier a Principal—Defendant Wife in One Case Lives in Devon.

Fifteen cases are expected to be on the docket of the New Brunswick Court of Divorce and Matrimonial Causes when it meets in this city on Tuesday next November 2nd. This docket will be one of the largest in the history of the court but not the largest as within the past year that number of cases has been exceeded.

Recently returned soldiers have figured largely as plaintiffs or defendants in divorce actions but the November term will have but one case in which a returned man is a principal.

Of the fifteen cases four are defended and eleven undefended. Five are remanets from the July term. One will not be heard being entered for hearing for the January term.

### New Cases

In Robert Karl Watson vs. Mary Olga Watson, the plaintiff is an express clerk residing in Moncton and the defendant formerly named Hayden resides in Woodstock. They were married at Houlton, Me., by Rev. W. H. Easton, Methodist clergyman of that town. They lived together as man and wife until January 1st, 1920. One child Mary Louise Watson, was born of the union in 1916. Infidelity on the part of the defendant wife is alleged to have taken place at the Barker House, Fredericton, September 19, 1919, with Gerald A. Hubbard of Burton, Sunbury County and also between the dates of October 24 and 29 of the same year. Infidelity with persons unknown to the plaintiff also has been alleged. The defendant alleges that he became aware of these acts of infidelity on January 1st, 1920, since which date he has not lived with the defendant. The case is defended.

In Philip Landry vs. Mary Landry the plaintiff is a resident of Havelock and the defendant of the same place. The defendant, formerly named Campbell was married to the plaintiff by Rev. Y. S. Gregg, Methodist clergyman, at Petitcodiac, April 2, 1919. They lived together until October 29, 1919. Harry Price also of Havelock is named as corespondent.

In Peter Miles Geldart vs. Annie May Geldart, formerly Steeves, the parties were married September 15, 1904, by Rev. A. A. Rutledge, at Hopewell, Albert County. Two children were born to them. February 16, 1909, the defendant left her husband and went to the United States. She lived with a man named Steeves as his wife at a place near Boston. After some three years she and Steeves separated or were in some way divorced and she lived with another man, name unknown, as his wife. With this man the defendant has been living at the home of her father, Joseph Steeves, 150 High Street, Moncton. The plaintiff inquired of his wife's sister at that address and was refused information concerning the name of the man with whom the defendant was living or concerning the place they had come from. This case is set for January term.

In Melbourne Jones vs. Melissa S. Jones, the principals were married at Shannon, Parish of Wickham, Queens County, by Rev. C. B. Lewis, Free Baptist, October 13, 1897. They resided at Kars, King's County, five years in which time there were born two sons and a daughter all of whom are now grown up. At the solicitation and interference of her mother Emily Cameron, wife of John Cameron, residing near them, the defendant returned to her parents home taking with her the eldest son. Two months later she went to St. John and to Boston in 1911. She took up her residence at 34 Hancock street in Boston. In the fall of 1911 and up to midsummer of 1912 the defendant was guilty of adulterous intercourse with William Morrison who occupied rooms on the floor above her rooms. The plaintiff heard of the infidelity for the first time about a year ago. The case is defended.

In Annie B. Newcombe vs. Freder-

ick J. Newcombe the defendant is a railway mail employe and both he and the plaintiff reside in St. John. Their marriage took place September 5, 1911 at Zion Methodist Church, St. John, Rev. William Lawson performing the ceremony. In September 1915 the defendant enlisted in the 104th Battalion later being transferred to the 140th Battalion and lived with his wife after enlistment in both St. John and Valcartier Village, Que. He went overseas in October 1916 and served in England and France until November 1918 when he returned to Canada. Until April 1920 the two lived together, agreeing to separate on that date. On August 1920 the defendant was guilty of infidelity with Jessie Howard at 161 Princess street, St. John and on July 31 of the same year he was guilty of infidelity with a woman unknown, an inmate of a house of ill-repute on the Golden Grove Road, Parish of Simonds, St. John County. At various times the defendant ill-treated the plaintiff and threatened her with a revolver. One son and one daughter were born of the union. The plaintiff formerly was named Logan.

In Lillian Edna Macbeth vs. William M. Macbeth the principals were united in marriage by Rev. J. H. McDonald, Baptist at Fredericton, December 13, 1912, and lived together at Ripples Sunbury County, for seven years and later at St. John. They separated January 18, 1920, and April 28 following the defendant went through a form of marriage to Elizabeth M. Rathburn at the home of Peleg Rathburn, Hampstead, Rev. L. H. Jewett, Methodist, performed the ceremony. Adultery with that woman and persons unknown is alleged.

The plaintiff is living in St. John and the defendant in Caribou, Me.

In Annie Aleavia Joseph vs. Russell Robert Joseph the plaintiff is a resident of Moncton and the defendant of Belle Isle Creek. They were married July 12, 1903, at Amherst, N. S., by Rev. Arthur Challenger of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. They lived together until May 4, 1915, at Amherst, the plaintiff leaving then on account of ill-treatment and non-support. Two children since deceased, were born. In January 1919 the defendant removed to St. John where he set up house-keeping with one Maud Hill and in September 1919 he removed to a farm at Belle Isle Creek which he had purchased, Maud Hill accompanying him.

In Arthur Howard Collier vs. Emma Collier the maiden name of the defendant was Power. The principals were married at Moncton at the home of the defendant's mother June 17, 1918, by Rev. E. H. Cochrane, Baptist. The plaintiff was under arrest at the time the ceremony was performed on a charge of bastardy preferred by the defendant. Next day having come to believe that he was not the father of the child of the defendant and that he had been coerced into marriage, he left her and has never lived with her since. The time of the birth of the child was fixed for the following December or January. It was born November 16th disproving the paternity of the plaintiff. In March 1919 the defendant went to live with William F. Lawrence of Moncton, a married man. On November 28, 1919, defendant took bastardy proceedings against Lawrence who acknowledged the offense, before a police magistrate in Moncton. March 5, 1920 the defendant gave birth to a child.

### Cases Formerly Filed

Two cases were filed at the July term. In Evelyn Ward McDonald vs. John Fenwick McDonald, Mrs. Josie Black of St. John is named as corespondent. The plaintiff resides in Halifax and the defendant in St. John. In James Francis Kealty vs. Lydia Kealty the principals reside at Jacques River. Rudolf or Duff Turlotte is named as corespondent. Both these cases are defended.

### Remanets

There are four remanets. In Clifford Gideon Steeves vs. Elsie Steeves the plaintiff resides in Moncton and the defendant in St. John. The corespondent is a man unknown. In David McKay vs. Nellie McKay the plaintiff resides at St. John and the respondent at Devon. Infidelity with persons unknown is alleged. In Violet E. Faulkner vs. Howard N. Faulkner, both parties reside in Woodstock. Mabel Peppers of Red Bridge is named as corespondent. In John S. Brown vs. Mabel Brown the plaintiff resides in Moncton and the defendant in Toronto. A man named McKeen is named as corespondent. Wilson vs. Wilson is a St. John case in which a woman named Gene Tait is named as corespondent.

Dr. H. B. Lawson, who has been occupying the Gunter residence on Brunswick st. is moving to Minto where he will practice. Mayor Wetmore of St. John will occupy it after Nov. 1st.
