THE INDEPENDENTS.

The North Shore Leader, which it is to be presumed is in a position to speak with some authority regarding the four Independent members elected in Northumberland, says in its last issue

"Northumberland County has elect ed four Independent candidates. The government organs state that they will support Foster; and the Opposition press claim them as supporters of Baxter. The Independents wer elected to work in the interest of Northumberland and the province in general. They will support all good measures, introduced by either Mr. Foster of Mr. Baxter or the leader of the Farmers' party. In conversation with our representatives, they stated that they would pursue an Independent course and would only divert from this stand when request ed to do so by the Northumberland County Independent party which nominated them. Should they deem it wise to take a side with either political party they will have a meeting of their supporters called, consult them, and abide by their decision."

The result of the recount in Charlotte while it changes the personnel of the members does not alter the standing of the parties. Mr. Pollard, who on the sheriff's return was fourth man, now loses by two votes, and Mr. Flewelling, who was declared not elected, takes second place. This was the result given on the night of the polling, and but for the carelessness of one of the deputy returning officers in making up his official returns there would not have been any need for a recount at all.

Well the recount was amply justified, as it has righted a wrong. Can the Standard say that a similar result would not follow a recount in St. John county?

For New Brunswick people the British Columbia election, which has been set for November 10th, has some special interest because two members of the Oliver Government-Hon. J. W. deB. Farris, Attorney-General, and Hon. J. H. King Minister of Public Works-and the leader of the Opposi tion-Hon. W. J. Bowser-are of New Brunswick birth. In the last Provincial election in British Columbia held in 1916 the Conservative Government led by Mr. Bowser was de feated and a Liberal Government came into power with Hon. H. C. Brewster-a New Brunswick manas Premier. On Premier Brewster's death in 1918 Hon. John Oliver became the leader of the Ministry.


