Y. M. C. A. IN FIRST PLACE IN THE YORK COUNTY BASEBALL LEAGUE; MARYSVILLE SLIPS DOWN ONE

Devon Beat Marysville 3 to 1 Last Evening and the Imperials Shut Fredericton City Out 4 to 0—Ill Feeling Marred the Latter Game—"Red" Foster Pitched Well for Losers—"Pat" Clark Also in Good Form—Batting Won for Imps.

All team percentages in the York County Baseball League with the exception of that of Y. M. C. A. changed last night. The changes put Y. M. C. A. at the top of the league as Marysville was beaten 3 to 1 by Devon and dropped down a notch. This is the second defeat Marysville has experienced from the Devon team. At the College Field Imperials shut Fredericton City out, 4 to 0, and made these two teams tied for the last place. Devon's claim on third position was slightly improved. Devon and Y. M. C. A. are to meet tonight in Devon in a postponed game and the result will further effect the standing. There is yet time for great changes in the league as the lower teams show a tendency to improve.

GOOD BALL AT COLLEGE FIELD
Seven Innings Between Imperials and City—Clashes among Spectators and Players.

Imperials and Fredericton City took the same standing in the York County League last night when the Imps shut out the West End team 4 to 0. The game was a good one and fast. Seven innings were played. If it had not been for a row among spectators and some other wrangling a game of full nine innings might have been played. "Red" Foster was used in the box by the Old timers and looked good. He held the Imperials to four hits. Three of those came in the first inning and with one error, the only one of the Fredericton City team, netted two runs. This lead the Imperials bettered in the fourth inning when Boyne drove out a two-bagger, Johnson drew a pass and both Wandless and Lifford sent line drives at W. Kennedy which he knocked down but could not handle in time to save runs.

In the field both teams were snappy there being but one error apiece. The Imperials had the better of the batting argument the Oldtimers getting only two safe ones off "Pat" Clark. The latter struck out five and Foster fanned nine of the Imps.

The losing team twice got men on third but they failed to score. Reckless base-running was the reason for that. Kenney was caught at the plate trying to score from third when he could have waited. Later he was caught at third. Foster made a two base hit only to be caught at third by Clark. Better coaching would have meant runs for the City team.

Too much ill-feeling between West End and East End was shown. This was between players and also between spectators. It produced two clashes which had to be broken up by bystanders and others.

The pro-amateur problem is again to the fore. Word has been received that reinstatement cannot be secured too.

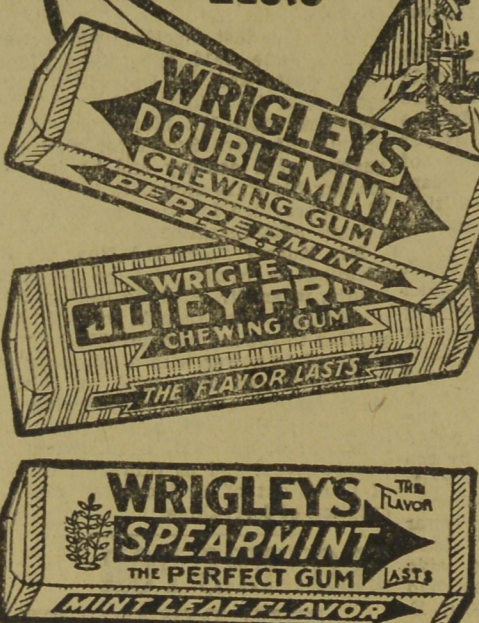
