THE WEEKLY MANICURE

Once a week at least the nails will need a fairly thorough manicure, if they are to have that "pink and polished" look which stands for proper care. Of course, as we have often discussed here, running over the nails once a day with an orange stick to push back the cuticle, and once every few days trimming down each nail with a piece of pumice paper, is enough to keep them looking so nice that detailed attention is necessary only now and then.

I find, for instance, that the busy business girl can get along with a professional manicure once a month, if she takes this minute-a-day care of her nails described above, and if, once a week, she gives them a little extra attention. And this extra attention is only this—

File down each nail to the proper length. Soak the fingers in warm, soapy water until the skin about the edges is soft. Clean off any stains with lemon juice. Push back the cuticle as you do each day after the hands are washed. Then take your manicure scissors, and run the blades under the edge of each nail, where it joins the skin. This is the part where hangnails collect and look ugly. Clip off the bit of the nail left ragged by your filing—it is always impossible to file the entire end of the nail—then turning your scissors, clip the rough skin that is sure to be in these two corners. Press back the skin so as to make a cleanlooking job of it. If necessary, clip off any ragged bits that may exist around the rest of the nail. Then polish thoroughly—and the weekly manicure is done.

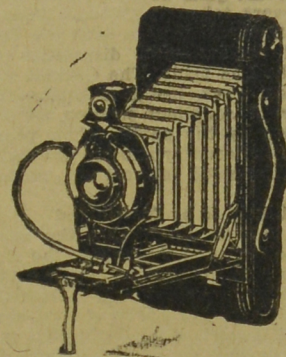
