DONALD FRASER PRESIDENT N.B. LUMBERMEN'S ASSOC.

Instructive Address Delivered by W. B. Snowball, of Chatham, Retiring President—Strongly Opposed to \$7 Stumpage Rate—Claimed Price of Lumber Not Excessive in View of Increased Expenses—Dr. C. C. Jones Made Plea for Forestry Students at University, Which will be Considered.

At the annual meeting of the New Brunswick Lumbermen's Association held in the Board of Trade Rooms here Thursday afternoon, W. B. Snowball of Chatham retired from the presidency and was succeeded by Donald Fraser of Plaster Rock. Previous to retiring Mr. Snowball delivered an address of considerable length in which he reviewed the past year in the lumber industry and contrasted conditions which obtain today with those of a few years ago. Chancellor Jones of the University of New Brunswick appeared before the meeting and there was discussion on the matter of operators being required under the Public Health Act to have all employees vaccinated. After the meeting a delegation went before the Provincial Government in relation to certain matters.

Dr. C. C. Jones
Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick was heard by the Association on the matter of the Forestry School of the Provincial University. He stated that seventy men were now taking courses at that school and that many of them were returned soldiers. It was considered advisable that they receive practical training and also employment and the various lumber firms of the province were asked to absorb them.

Favorable consideration was given to the request of Dr. Jones and his request was referred to the new executive.

Objection to Regulation
J. P. Burchill, M. P. P. brought up the matter of the requirement under the Public Health Act, that operators be responsible for their employees being vaccinated. There was some discussion on the point opposition being expressed and it finally was decided to make representations to the Government on the point.

Resolution on Retiring President
W. B. Snowball vacating the office of president, the Association by resolution expressed appreciation of the manner in which he had filled the office and expressed regret that he had seen fit to retire from it.

We are pleased to welcome so many at our annual meeting and trust that the subjects discussed may be productive of good, not only to the industry that we represent, but to our whole province. There is no doubt but the manufacturers of the forest products of New Brunswick represent the most important industry in our province and we should be men of broad vision, men who are willing to forego the immediate gain to assure the con-

tinuance of the industry that not only provides the greatest employment, but on which practically all the industries and trades, and even farming depends.

Conservation

Conservation in our forest cutting should be our great slogan—not curtailment, but so cutting our logs that the most can be got out of them, and the bringing out of as much of the trees as can be utilized in saw, pulp or lath mill and in every way co-operating with the Crown Land Department or private owners.
