STEPS TAKEN TO EXPEDITE THE PROCEEDINGS IN THE LEGISLATURE; SHORT WEEK-END ADJOURNMENT

House Will Resume on Tuesday Next, but Next Saturday Adjournment Will be Until Monday — Government Heard Delegations Last Night—Committee on Teachers' Salaries Met This Morning—Wretched Train Service Has Prevented Monday Night Sessions So Far.

Adjournment over the week and will come it is expected after this afternoon's session of the legislature. The adjournment will be until three o'clock Tuesday afternoon to enable the members to return to their homes.

Supply on Wednesday Next

It is understood that notice of Supply will be given this afternoon for Wednesday next. This will be the beginning of what usually is the long debate of the session. It had been expected that the Budget would come down this week but a slight prologing of the debate on the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne made that impossible. The Report of the Comptroller General probably will be tabled.

Night Sessions Forecasted

It was stated this morning that there would be a forecast this afternoon of late sessions on Friday and Saturday of next week with an adjournment from Saturday until the following Monday afternoon. This action will be taken to expedite matters as far as legislative business is concerned. On account of the heavy snow which was general over the southern portion of the province this winter an early break-up will make travelling difficult and it is desirable that all members, particularly those closely associated with the lumbering industry will be able to finish their duties at the House and return to private business.

Train Service Wretched

The members of the legislature are finding out what the people of Fredericton have known for some time, that the train service into this city is the worst in years. The second evening train from St. John which brings people from the eastern section of the province has regularly been about an hour and a half late with the result that members from Moncton, Westmorland, Kent and Albert have reached Fredericton at eleven o'clock at night. On the Newcastle-Fredericton section of the C. N. R. similar conditions have prevailed with the result that members from the North Shore

cannot arrive here in time for a Monday night session except by taking a train before daylight, at Campbellton, Bathurst or Newcastle. This fact has made it impossible to hold Monday night sessions.

Committee on Teachers' Salaries

The Committee on Teachers' Salaries, appointed during recess to consider the question and bring in a report, met this morning at the Educational Office. The report of the committee is prepared and will be presented to the House next week. Those present at this morning's meeting were Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Supt. of Education, Chairman; Hon. W. E. Foster, premier; W. S. Sutton, M.P. representing the Opposition; W. McL. Barker of Moncton, representing the Teachers' Association; Hon. P. J. Veniot.

Reply to His Honor

His Honor the Lieut. Governor did not come from his home last night but will arrive either Monday night or Tuesday. The committee to present the Address in Reply to the Speech from the Throne will wait upon him and present the Address early next week. The committee is composed of Mr. Magee the mover, Mr. Melanson the seconder and Hon. J. F. Tweeddale representing the executive.

University Delegation

The delegation representing the Senate and Associated Alumni of the University of New Brunswick appeared before the Provincial Government last night. A request was made for the province to grant an amount toward the memorial building which is to be erected at the university. The request is that the province grant dollar for dollar of the amount which the University can raise. It was stated that fifty thousand dollars was the sum which the University authorities expect to raise by subscription and in other ways. Consideration was promised.
