WANTS A UNION OF THE PROGRESSIVE PARTIES

Hon. Charles Murphy Addresses Women's Club at Milton, Ont.—Says the Parties Working Against a Reactionary Government at Ottawa Have a Common Aim and Should be United.

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—That the three great progressive forces in Canada, the Liberals, Farmers and Labor, are working toward a common aim and against a reactionary government which has out-run its mandate, and that there should be a working alliance among these three groups was the thought expressed by Hon. Charles Murphy, member for Russell, Ont., in the Dominion parliament, in addressing the Women's Liberal Club at Milton, Ont., tonight. During the Liberal regime, Mr. Murphy declared, there had been no farmers' party because there had been no need of such. The farmers' parties in the past he said, had grown up because there was discontent under Tory administration. When the people rejected reciprocity by defeating the Liberal government the Farmers' party had begun to develop. The Liberals while in power and in opposition from 1911 to 1920 had shown in and out of the house that they were fighting the battle of the producers in Canada. They had striven, Mr. Murphy declared, to secure legislation which the farmers and other producers demanded. The Liberals had moved to place wheat, wheat products, fertilizer, agricultural implements and potatoes on the free list, and these attempts had been defeated by the Tories. The Liberals had also sought to increase the British preference to fifty per cent and these motions had been voted down by the Conservative government majorities.

The essential features of the Liberal and Farmer tariff platforms were practically identical, Mr. Murphy claimed, and since the advent of the Farmers in the House of Commons they had voted with the Liberals.

Foster's Hard Names.

That the government looked upon them as similar in their aims and ideals, Mr. Murphy said, was evident from the fact that Sir George Foster had referred to Farmers and Liberals alike as "Bolsheviki," "seditionists" and "wreckers," and such language as that should be punished and that can be done only by a working alliance between those to whom the language was applied.

The result of an isolated case like the victory of the Farmer candidate in East Elgin did not lessen the need of a working arrangement between the parties opposing the government, he said.

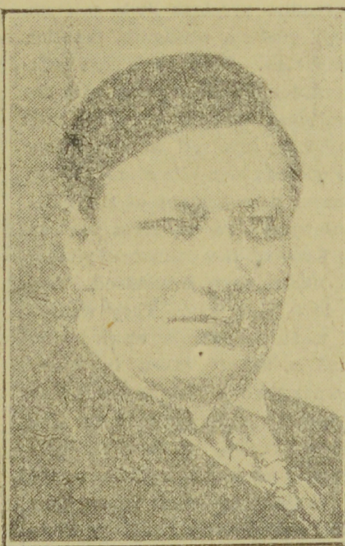
The Liberal attitude toward labor had been equally helpful, Mr. Murphy declared that it therefore afforded ground for co-operation between Labor and Liberalism in their common fight for a return of democratic government. The present was one of usurpers, he said, whose mandate had expired, and who sought, under the camouflage of an assumed name and a new leadership to hang on to power after the conditions upon which union government was formed had ceased to exist.
