

YOUNG MAN KILLED BY SLIDE AT TAYMOUTH

WAS ENGAGED ON
C. N. R. CONSTRUCTION

Embankment Caved and Crushed
George Cummings of P.
E. I. Against a Steam
Shovel.

George Cummings son of Malcolm Cummings of New Wiltshire, P. E. I., was killed at Taymouth Thursday morning by a slide of an embankment on the reconstruction work on the C. N. R. being carried on by R. B. Stewart, contractor. The unfortunate young man was crushed against the running board of a steam shovel and also was buried by the slide. It is believed that death was instantaneous. Young Cummings was crushed about the back and chest.

Dr. D. E. Moore of Stanley, coroner was summoned and viewed the body which was not recovered until about half an hour after the accident. The coroner arrived shortly after the body was recovered and after a view decided that death had been due to accident and that an inquest was not necessary. Upon permission for the removal of the body being given it was taken to the Presbyterian Church and the father of the deceased was notified by telegraph. A short service was conducted by Rev. Ernest Westmorland at the church and the body was forwarded to Prince Edward Island last night.

The deceased had arrived at Taymouth on the 23rd and gone to work on construction. He was aged nineteen years.

Winding Up Glass Company

Moncton Transcript: Before Mr. Justice Chandler, on Monday, a petition for the voluntary winding up of the Humphrey's Glass Limited, was presented pursuant to a notice to the company. This company has a considerable amount of cash and plant on hand. At a special general meeting of the stockholders held on the 22nd day of June, A. D. 1920 a resolution was unanimously passed authorizing the voluntary winding up of the company. The petitioner is Henry Havelock Warman, of Moncton, who is a large stockholder. The order was issued appointing Stanley E. Calhoun, who was formerly in the employ of the company, as provisional liquidator. The order was also issued that each stockholder of the company be notified. E. A. Reilly, K. C., presented the petition.

WILL FOLLOW UP
INSPECTION IN SCHOOLS

Appointment Requested by the
Child Welfare League—Con-
nected With District
Nurse's Duties.

Miss Peterson, District Nurse, for Fredericton and vicinity is to act as a Board of Health official in the matter of medical inspection in the public schools. Her duties will be to follow up the work of the medical inspector.

This action has been taken by the Board of Health at the request of the Child Welfare League which had a delegation before the Board at the regular meeting last night. The delegation was composed of ex-Ald. J. M. Lemont, Mrs. M. L. Stevenson, Miss Jennie Cooper, ex-Ald. Joseph Walker and Dr. B. C. Foster. The delegation stated that Miss Peterson was willing to accept the appointment without salary, performing the duties along with her own. Several meetings of the Child Welfare League had been held at which the matter had been discussed. After the hearing of the delegation the Board decided to appoint Miss Peterson an official without salary.

The rest of the session of the Board of Health was taken up by routine business. No report on milk was received but that on water was very satisfactory.

Red Cross Drive

A meeting of the local Red Cross Society was held in the Board of Trade rooms last evening and organizations were perfected for the financial drive they will make next week. Two committees were formed. An advertising committee and a drive committee. J. J. McAfee was given authority to act for the committee on advertising. 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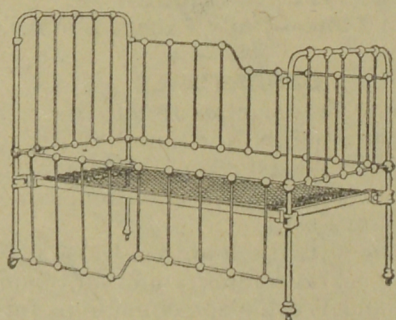
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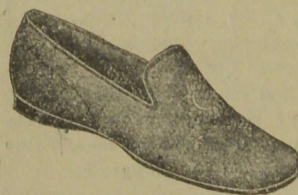
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
