## HOW CANADIAN INDUSTRY IS HELPED BY FOREIGN CREDITS

Large Quantities of Surplus Military Stores are Being Shipped to Greece by the Militia Department—Manufacturers Have Now an Excellent Opportunity to Sell Goods to Roumania. Demand is Most Insistent.

Ottawa, May 5.—A return tabled to-day shows that of the \$25,000,000 credit extended to Greece only \$2,740,000 has been expended to date and \$17,906,443.38 of the \$25,000,000 credit given to Roumania. The orders given for Greece have been of a military nature mainly while those of Roumania have been of a nature to help that country reconstruct and reestablish itself in the quickest possible time agriculturally as well as supply dire necessities. Greece orders give the militia department a splendid chance to get rid of military supplies and clothing of which it had a surplus.

It is interesting to see the way in which various firms throughout Canada have benefited from the orders given under these credits. The largest orders have been for woollens. Greece buying to the value of \$1,494,865.75 and Roumania to \$4,264,147.65. Orders ran from a few thousands of dollars. The Atlantic Underwear Company of Moncton, was the only New Brunswick firm to get a share of the business, securing an order for \$30,831.75. The department of militia and defence sold woollens valued at \$435,449.66 to Greece. For men's suits there was spent in Canada \$3,626,829 on the Roumanian orders. The Canadian Export Clothiers of Montreal got \$1,651,019.17 of this order. The overall campaign evidently struck Roumania before this continent got wise to it, as

its orders include \$1,608,412.78 for shirts and overalls.

Roumania got paints, varnishes and brushes from Canada valued at \$222,506.44; Sherwin Williams of Montreal getting the largest order for \$3,490.

As Greece was mainly after military supplies the department of militia and defence profited most from the purchases made here, selling boots for \$170,600, blankets for \$276,750 and sweaters for \$22,550. The only considerable item bought by Greece was leather valued at \$740,100.39, divided between four Ontario firms. The other articles sold to Greece were: Dubbing \$17,563.98; revolver holsters, \$3,232; curry combs, \$4,843.76; wax candles, \$8,952.30 and "Sam Brown" belts, \$1,542.

The third largest order from Roumania was for wheat, valued at \$3,524,635.21. Other large orders were cotton textile, \$1,779,453.64; cotton yarn, \$106,607.65; agricultural binders and parts, \$685,987.43; binder twine, \$941,017.30; edged tools, \$137,214.87; butter workers and churns, \$12,790; roofing, among five firms, \$267,175.48; bags and twine, \$92,910; nails, \$308,939.63, of which the Dominion Iron and Steel Company got \$129,612.99 and the Maritime Nail Company, St. John, N. B., \$69,168.73, and two other Montreal companies the rest. steel rails and accessories, Dominion Iron and Steel Co., Montreal, \$262,591.30; pig iron, same company, \$66,138.48.

## CARRANZAS' POWER DIMINISHING—REVOLUTION SO FAR BLOODLESS

Washington, May 5.—Recognition of Carranza's rapidly diminishing power in Mexico was admitted by government officials today, but the despatch of a flotilla of destroyers to southern waters was not taken to indicate that foreigners are in immediate danger. The six destroyers which sailed from New York will arrive at Key West tomorrow and will be used along the East coast only in the event that necessity arises.

Such information as was available here continued to indicate the bloodless character of the revolution. The southward movement of the rebel forces along the west coast was continued, but no reports of any engagement were received. The request for naval protection at ports on the east coast was construed by the government as precautionary. Although no overt act had been recorded in the vicinity of the ports, it is understood British consular officers concurred with American representatives that ships should be available near Tampico, Tuxpam, Vera Cruz and Fronteras, to afford a refuge for foreigners if conflict made temporary retirement advisable.

Development of the revolution, as reported to the government, has been so rapid as to convince many officials and army officers that Carranza cannot maintain his authority much longer.
