CHINESE COLONY IN BOSTON CELEBRATED THANKSGIVING

(Boston Globe.)

"Yes, we celebrate A'Melican holiday Thanksgiving Day," said Wong Duck of Oxford st.

Moy Dow, the leading Chinese of Boston, National organizer of the Chinese Merchants' Association and interpreter for the colony, introduced the Globe man to Duck, who is more than 80 years old and who usually refuses to say a word for publication on any subject. A reporter for the Globe secured the first interview with Duck last February. He spoke a dozen words at that time on the Chinese New Year.

The interview with Duck yesterday was also very brief. Except for the words above all he said was: "Snow out; lots rain before. Lot's snow on ground soon."

Moy Dow and the reporter after these few remarks left Duck's room. Duck slammed the door, muttering something in Chinese.

"What did he say?" asked the reporter.

"Says don't come again," politely remarked Moy Dow.

All Chinatown celebrated Thanksgiving. It was the first time in the history of the colony that the "A'Melican Thanksgiving" has been celebrated on a large scale. The Chinese were eager to know what it was all about. So Moy Dow and Yee Wah Fook told them. Most of them had only recently heard that there was any such holiday. But Wong Duck though he is hard to interview, knew the significance of the day and why it is celebrated in America.

It was by a majority vote of the Chinese Merchants' Association last week that a decision was made to observe Thanksgiving Day. Every store-keeper who has an American flag displayed it alongside of the Chinese flag and other emblems of the Orient.

day night to remain over the new holiday, hundreds of Chinese from Greater Boston and some came by invitation from New York, Springfield, Worcester, Portland and Providence.

And the "night before" was a big night. Games, including the "A'Melican Cow," were played but how much money changed hands no one knows. Nobody ever wins, if you believe an Oriental.

Just how many Chinese boys and girls there are in Chinatown no one seems to know. Estimates as to numbers are varied, but at the Quiney School there are known to be about 50 boys and girls in all. The Chinese kiddies have of course heard of the American Thanksgiving from their teachers in school and have told their parents about it.

Credit Belongs to Children.

So to the children belongs much of the credit for the big celebration in the colony yesterday. The Chinese children love "the movies." The grownups take the little ones to the picture shows, buy them presents, take them out automobile riding and know just how to have a good time on a holiday.

The Chinese don't care a "hoot" for breakfast, and wonder why anyone has an appetite in the morning. At noon they eat a bowl of rice and some times take a small order of chop suey. But at five o'clock in the afternoon they pitch in and have a big meal. And most of them manage to enjoy a bowl of rice wine or a cup of Chinese whiskey or gin, despite prohibition.

Yesterday the big feasts were declared on about 5 o'clock at the different Chinese cafes and in the homes.

Turkey was plentiful enough, but thick steaks of venison and beef really seemed to be more popular. When an order for turkey was given to a Chinese waiter, he would yell out to the chef. "Faw Gai!" If the customer preferred potato dressing to bread dressing, the waiter would say something which sounded like "Lake Mao Loot."

SPLENDOR OF THE JUNGLE NOT DIMINISHING

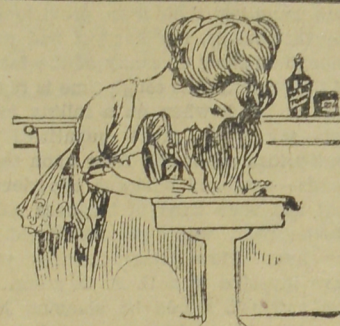

London, Nov. 16—Gay plumage is not a sex-attraction among birds of paradise, according to Wilfred Frost, collector of the Zoological Society of London, who has returned from the Malay Archipelago. He reports that King Birds of Paradise and Greater Birds of Paradise are very abundant and show no signs of diminution in numbers.

He has never been able to see the nests of the King Birds. Each male selects an individual tree as his home and attacks any other male which comes near him. They appear to prefer the vicinity of human dwellings. The Greater Bird of Paradise is more gregarious and lives farther from man kind. The nests are large and conspicuous.

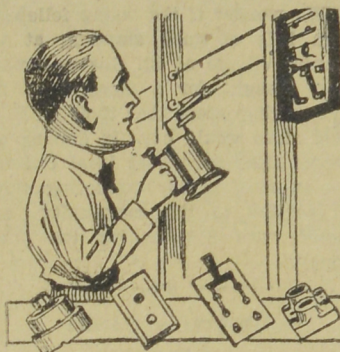
The brilliant yellow plumes are not acquired until the sixth or seventh year, r. FMrost says he has never seen a male in full plumage breeding with a hen bird. The males associated with hens and young were always in immature plumage of the second, third, fourth or fifth year. In the case of captive birds he found that the hens were not attracted by birds in full plumage but only by young males. He regards the elaborate decoration as a sign of senility.

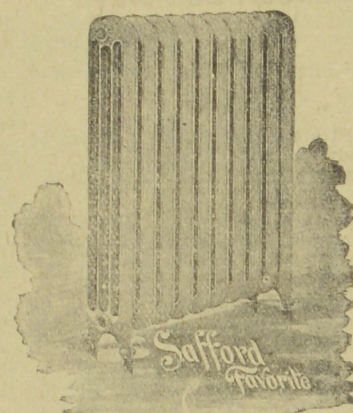

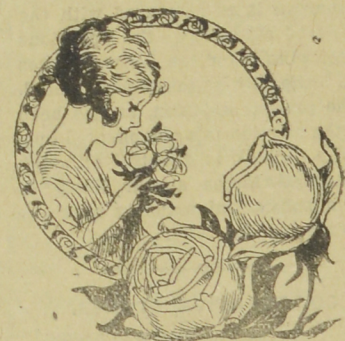
