BACK SAVERS FOR HOUSEWORK

Just because you do not do any of your own housework is no reason why you should not get as many back savimagine that just because a woman spends much of her time on her hands and knees scrubbing or waxing or polishing floors her back is any beter suited to this kind of work than yours, or that it is any easier for your maid to stoop down to use the ordinary dustpan and brush broom or that she never feels the effects of a tired back at the end of the day:

The thoroughly up to date kitchen has as many as possible of the parts of the equipment placed on a table level. A new fireless cooker is recommended because it is at table level, so that you do not have to lean over to get to it.

The father was a weaver in Dunfermline, and in him was strongly ingrained that Scotch craving for education, for he was one of the five-weav ers who started the Dunfermline circulating library.

With the coming of steam machinery the father's earnings declined, and the family emigrated to the United States, the move being made possible by a loan from a devoted woman friend of Mrs. Carnegie. They found it almost as hard to get upon a selfsupporting basis in the United States and for a while Mrs. Carnegie earned four dollars a week binding shoes to make the family exchequer adequate.
