SHOEMAKERS WERE HEARD BY TARIFF COMMISSION

Deny That They Have Been Profiteering or Have Used the Tariff to Boost Prices—J. D. Palmer of Fredericton in a Controversy With Sir Henry Drayton—A \$20 Pair of Shoes Not a Luxury Says Mr. Palmer.

Montreal, Nov. 16—Canadian manufacturers of boots and shoes this afternoon contended before the tariff commission that their prices are not and never have been profiteering prices and that the tariff has not been used by them to boost the selling price of their product. At the same time they pleaded for the maintenance of the present protection on the ground that United States manufacturers have a capacity beyond the needs of their own markets and would be glad to flood their surplus into Canada if given a chance by the dropping down of the tariff bars. One manufacturer said that dumping is even now in progress, telling Sir Henry Drayton of a carload of boots and shoes of which he had learned coming to Montreal from the United States invoiced at \$2.50 a pair. Those shoes could be made by his company at a cost of five or six dollars a pair, but these "dumped" shoes would sell for about \$4.75 a pair. He thought that the law against "dumping" should be applied in this case.

Loud complaint was launched against the luxury taxes instituted at the last session of parliament. All those who spoke said that these taxes were responsible for a considerable share of the present unemployment because the public simply refused to buy shoes on which they would pay the taxes, and in consequence the country was overstocked with a class of shoes for which there had previously been a large demand.

Sir Henry Drayton and J. D. Palmer, of the Hartt Boot and Shoe Company, Fredericton, who presented the general case for the manufacturers of boots and shoes, had a good humored controversy as to whether a twenty-dollar pair of shoes could be considered a luxury or not. Sir Henry was decidedly of the opinion that such shoes were luxuries while Mr. Palmer contended that shoes having the best of wearing and comfortable material in them as well as careful workmanship might be well worth twenty dollars a pair just from the point of view of a necessity.

Style of Things.

"I am told that the style is the whole thing in creating such a high price and I was told by a manufacturer," said Sir Henry.

"You were not rightly informed," retorted Mr. Palmer.

"Shoes of that value have materials much more valuable than other shoes. In wear, comfort and convenience they are worth the extra price. We

ourselves are not selling one shoe less than nine dollars a pair, and our prices are figured as closely as they can be."

Referring to the contention that the luxury taxes are instilling habits of economy where they wear people from the expensive shoes habit, Mr. Palmer said, "if it is the interest of the state that some should perish, we will have to take it but it is putting a premium on trash." When the chairman was trying to find out why shoes should be so high in price when hides are selling at such low prices, Mr. Palmer said that he did not really know the price of hides today, that the prices quoted were not the real prices but fictitious ones, and that if a man tried to buy hides at the prices quoted he could not get them.

T. H. Rieder, manager president of the Ames-Holden-McCready Company Montreal, said that the profits made during the last three years "either have been or will be dissipated during the present year."

Outlook Not Bright.

Montreal, Nov. 15—The main feature of today's session of the tariff commission here was a prolonged argument with regard to the requirements and position of the Canadian Boot and Shoe industry, presented by J. D. Palmer, of the Hartt Boot and Shoe Company, Fredericton, N. B.

While Mr. Palmer presented a gloomy picture of the straits of the industry at the present time, with factories closing, prices declining on high-priced goods, unemployment among operatives and suffering caused by general dumping of surplus goods from the United States, his statement was enlivened by a series of animated discussions with Sir Henry Drayton. These were especially lively in regard to the luxury tax which Mr. Palmer and other shoe men objected to strenuously, declaring that a good shoe at \$20 was not a luxury. Neither Sir Henry nor Mr. Palmer could convince the other, but both awaited further figures.

The session was opened in the morning by a brief speech by Mayor Martin, who was followed by Albert Monet for the market gardeners' association, asking that their growing industry be granted adequate protection, in any tariff changes. F. W. Stewart presented a carefully prepared statement on behalf of the Montreal branch of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association, saying that a retention of the present tariff was needed to keep the plants in operation. A long discussion followed on the presentation of a factum for the Canadian piano and musical instrument manufacturers of Canada, by A. P. Willis. The case for the leather-belt manufacturers was presented by Lieutenant-Colonel W. J. Sadler.

MARYSVILLE NEWS.

Marysville, Nov. 16—The good citizens of this bustling little "Temperance town" did not appreciate the remarks made by Chief Finley of the Fredericton Police Force, recently, in reference to Marysville.
