NOVA SCOTIA HAS ANOTHER SPEEDY COLT

Karava Has Produced Valuable Colt by John D.—Other Fast Ones in Sister Province.

Halifax Recorder: The great brood mare Karava, by Kremlin, dam Ella Nutwood, is again the producer of a valuable colt, by John D., by J. Malcolm Forbes, 2.08, dam Bertha Guy (dam of Bertha Forbes 2, 2.22 1/4), by Guy Axworthy, the importation of Charles E. Smith.

The youngster is quite a rugged one and the dam looks good for a few more yet. Notwithstanding she is 22 years old and this is her 13th foal, she will likely be bred to Capt. Aubrey, and many horsemen would like to see the result of the combination. Mr. Musgrave the former owner of Karava lost three colts in succession by the latter horse, a very promising weanling being injured in the explosion so severely that he died.

The new arrival inherits a combination of racing blood hard to beat, Bin gen, Kremlin, Axworthy, Nutwood and out of a dam that produced the fastest colt trotters bred in the Maritime Provinces; Achille the Great, two-year-old record of 2.30 the first colt of that age to trot to a standard record in the Provinces; three-year-old 2.23 1/4, and raced as a four-year-old to the New Brunswick record of 2.20 and competed in the United States against the best four-year-olds out that season for a \$2000 purse and got second money, the champion four-year-old mare Czarina winning first.

Baring's Comet, two-year-old record, 2.23 ; three-year-old record, 2.22 1/4; five-year-old record, 2.16 1/4, was another colt that raced at Brockton as a two-year old against Noraday Girl, 2.14 1/4, world's champion of the season and got fourth money in a field of seven starters. He won all his starts in the Fall, at the Halifax Exhibition of 1915 and he was then shipped to the United States and won two first and two seconds in classy company. At Rockingham New Hampshire he was beaten by inches by Alma, 2.10 1/4, winning in 2.14, 2.14 1/4, over a heavy track.

Lochille now owned by B. F. O'Neill is another promising horse he having won as a two year old the race at Halifax Exhibition of 1917. Bell Baring, winner of the ice race at the island last winter is another good racing prospect.

Geo. Hamilton, Halifax, is the breeder of the last colt of Karava, and followers of the breeding interests will wish him every success. Mr. Hamilton also owns Maggie Bogash, which has a nice yearling by Mr. Smith's John D.

Oro Fino, 2.03 1/4, Syndicate Purchase, Exhibit—Serious Accident in Races at Sydney.

Woodstock, May 24—Ideal weather, a good track and a field of fast horses attracted over fifteen hundred people to Connell Park this afternoon to witness the programme of races staged by the Woodstock Driving Club.

The 67th regiment band under the direction of its new conductor, Eugene C. Arnold, enlivened the proceedings with popular music.

Oro Fino, 2.03 1/4, purchased last week at Readville Mass., for members of the driving club, was driven in front of the grand stand amid ehe cheers of the crowd. He is a splendid looking animal and his new owners expect to have him in the big races, July 12 and 13. Dr. Standish, of the American Horse Breeder, who was one of the judges, did not hesitate to say that Woodstock had a plant and location that had no equal in New England and eastern Canada.

At Sydney, Sydney, N. S., May 24—Before the largest crowd that ever attended a race meeting in Sydney, Our Peggy, Jennie Frisco and Ned Achille were returned winners in the three classes. This composed the curtain raiser meeting here on the holiday. The 4,500 people who thronged the local track saw what was undoubtedly the finest racing that has been witnessed here on May 24th in the past ten years.

Ollie Rudderham, of Point Edward owner and driver of Annie Laurie, was seriously injured and is now at the City Hospital. While driving Annie Laurie up the stretch to score the mare which had been acting badly, kicked Rudderham in the jaw and knocked him from his sulky. She raced up the track and crashed into a team before stopping.
