A CAPABLE MINISTER

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale, the able and energetic Minister of Agriculture is deserving of hearty congratulations on the great speech which he delivered in the House yesterday. The Minister of Agriculture does not often take part in the debates but when he does he has something to say, and the House never fails to sit up and take notice. The Minister is a veteran in the game of politics, both provincial and municipal; he has a retentive memory and there are few better posted men in the public life of the province. Hon. Mr. Tweeddale sat in the House when the Hazen Government held the reins of power, and from his place on the opposition benches exposed the insincerity and hypocrisy of the government with respect to the Valley Railway. He was one of the first to catch on to the fact that the government was playing the game for the big interests, at the expense of the general public and he not only told them so at the time but made certain predictions which have been fulfilled to the letter. When he declared in his speech yesterday that the former government never had the slightest intention of building the Valley Railway from Grand Falls to St. John he was stating a fact which must now be apparent to everybody.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale in his speech devoted considerable attention to the achievements of his department during the past three years. It is naturally a source of pride to him as it should be to every other patriotic New Brunswicker. The splendid success of the greater production campaign was referred to and Dominion Government statistics were quoted to show the wonderful development which New Brunswick has experienced in the live stock industry. The marvellous success achieved along agricultural lines under Hon. Mr. Tweeddale's leadership has done much to remove the stigma which attached to the name of the province during the dark days of the old regime.

The Minister's speech was an able review of the splendid work being accomplished by his department and a crushing reply to the criticisms and cheap sneers of the opposition. Hon. Mr. Tweeddale is the ablest administrator the Department of Agriculture has ever had. A practical knowledge of agriculture combined with business ability of a high order has enabled him to make the department of real value not only to those engaged in agriculture but to the province as a whole.

SHOULD HAVE RESIGNED

The Moncton Transcript, discussing Mr. Tilley's speech on the budget and the attitude of those members of the house who last year censured Hon. Jams A. Murray and at the St. John convention opposed his leadership, says:

"If Mr. Murray had not been under a cloud and if after fighting against his election to the leadership Mr. Tilley had agreed to accept the will of the majority, his actions would not be a legitimate subject of reproach. But Mr. Murray having been publicly censured by his followers in the House Mr. Tilley and his friends were under definite obligations to stand by their resolution of censure, and refuse to accept the decision of a packed convention. Their own self respect demanded it; if they had been troubled by any active sense of political honesty and public decency they would have resigned their seats in the House before swallowing their vote of censure at the behest of political heelers indifferent to the party's reputation."

Victoria Times. Mr. Tweeddale and then the would be leader quietly reverted to the ranks.

LOCAL NEWS

New Partnerships

Booze for West Indies.

St. John Times: Whether in anticipation of a lucrative tourist season or to alleviate drought among regular inhabitants, heavy shipments of liquor are now being made to the West Indies. There are in St. John today four, teen carloads of liquor to be shipped aboard the S. S. Canadian Adventurer. Extra police have been detailed for service to guard the shipments. A. J. Tingley, district special agent in the police department of the C. N. R. at Moncton, is supervising the shipments.

Now on Bagdad Railway

J. Carleton Brown formerly of Fredericton, according to the U. N. B. Monthly is now located in Constantinople and is in charge of the operation of a section of the Bagdad Railway. He is ranking Lt. Colonel in the Royal Engineers and recently had the Order of the British Empire conferred upon him for service in the Balkans and against the Bolsheviks.

Created Disturbance

One man was arrested yesterday on a warrant of Magistrate R. J. Lawlor of Newcastle charged with creating a disturbance on a public car. The offence was committed some days ago. Officer O. B. Lawson of the C. N. R. started north last night but owing to the washouts he was obliged to return his prisoner to the police station and wait over till today.

War Memorial Committee

A meeting of the War Memorial Committee was held yesterday afternoon at two o'clock in the Mayor's office. It was intended that the Committee meet with the Town Councils of Devon and Marysville, and the City and the County Councils. As very few of the members of these bodies were present nothing was done. The object of the Memorial Committee in meeting with these men is to ascertain if they are desirous of joining in the erection of a memorial in this city to the men who fell in the Great War. A delegation is to be appointed to meet with the various councils at some of their regular meetings. In the meantime the Committee is to go ahead and obtain plans, estimates, etc.

Injured in Montreal.

Word has been received in the city of a painful accident which befell Miss Ella A. Thorne, in Montreal. Miss Thorne, who is a member of the staff of the Fredericton High School left for Montreal on Thursday evening to have her eyes treated. It is thought that drops were put in her eyes, for whilst walking down the stairs of the Y. M. C. A. she fell and fractured a rib. It was necessary to take her to a hospital and she will not be able to return to her home for ten days at least. During her absence, Miss Esther Clark is supplying at the High School.

Returned to Fredericton.

Mr. and Mrs. James S. Neill, who have spent the winter in California arrived in the city at noon today, after a very enjoyable trip.

New York, April 7—Charles M. Schwab, who is president of the Oratorio Society of New York, as well as head of the Bethlehem Steel Company, paused long enough yesterday in his preparations for the music festival to be held in the Seventy-first Regiment Armory to recommend good music as a cure for Bolshevism.

"Music is a great antidote for unrest," Mr. Schwab said, "for the most primitive and ignorant are susceptible to music. It's a sedative and a stabilizer and promotes beautiful thoughts. 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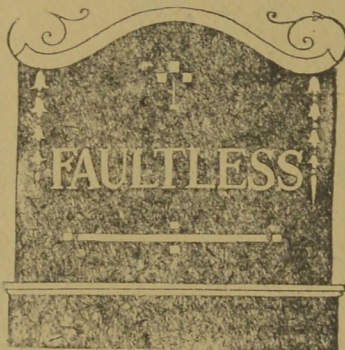
