VOCATIONAL TRAINING REQUIRES A RATHER HEAVY EXPENDITURE

**Moncton Moves for One-third of Prohibition Fines, and Seeks
Fredericton's Support—R. B. Hanson Appointed City Solicitor—Retainer of \$250 per Annum—Considerable Routine Business by the City Council.**

The City Council met last evening in the Council Chamber. Mostly routine business was discussed, and all the members were in their places with the exception of Ald. Cooper.

Auditor's Report

The Auditor's report was read for the month of March, and was as follows:

This report was adopted by the Council.

Ald. Barker then read the Municipal Home report on the Municipal Home Dept. This report showed an expenditure of \$169.02 and \$93.66 on outdoor relief, leaving a cash balance of \$28.46.

Ald. Wilkinson moved that a cheque for the amount of \$7,500 be issued in favor of the Board of School Trustees to meet the current indebtedness and to provide for a sinking fund. This motion was passed.

Tax Collections

The Tax Collector's report was received and placed on file.

It showed: Taxes collected March 1919, \$1656.83; Taxes collected March 1920, \$1736.10.

The Council confirmed all of the business done at Monday night's committee meeting, and fixed the assess-

ment for the ensuing year at \$215,000.

Vocational Training

A communication was read from Chas. A. Sampson, the Secretary of the Board of School Trustees asking for the payment of the amount of \$800 ordered last year for the carrying on of the vocational work in the city schools. This amount was ordered paid.

Another request from the same source was for a further grant of \$2500. It was stated in this request that \$1200 would be needed in the first part of the year and the remainder \$1300 beginning in January 1921. It is expected by the Board that it will be necessary to form additional classes in electrical engineering, motor mechanics, and plumbing. This matter was left to the Finance Committee which will confer with the Board of School Trustees.

Want Share of Fines

A letter was read from W. A. McWilliam, Acting City Clerk of the City of Moncton, asking for the co-operation of Fredericton in petitioning the Government that one third of the fines collected in Prohibition cases be paid into the treasuries of the various cities in which the offences may be committed. His Worship had already written asking for fuller particulars in the matter, and the subject will be discussed at the next meeting of the Council.

City Solicitor

The matter of retaining R. B. Hanson, K. C. as the City Solicitor was reported on by Ald. Wilkinson on behalf of the Finance Committee. Mr. Hanson has expressed his willingness of accepting this position and places his salary at \$250 per year, payable quarterly. He will give his advice, and opinion in any matters and draft all ordinary resolutions, etc. Certain special matters will, of course, have to be considered outside of this fee. Ald. Wilkinson moved, seconded by Ald. Barker that R. B. Hanson, K. C. be appointed City Solicitor and that he be granted a fee of \$250 as a retainer and that an agreement be entered into with him further.

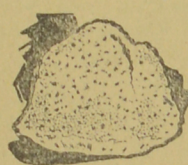

"Few persons outside the teaching profession realize how some wives have to manage to make ends meet.

"When a woman holds a position just to add a few dollars to the family income, and the domestic machinery cannot be adjusted when she is away through the day, the extra money does not justify the family dissensions resulting from the wife's absence. The decent type of husband has the right to expect a pleasant home and a cheerful wife when he returns in the evening. Two tired, irritable persons make a peevish combination.

"If a woman's profession is her vocation, without which her life would be empty and drear, and she has acquired a husband in the bargain, why I suppose the husband will have to worry along without his home maker somehow. But if the wife's work is merely a job, that enables her to buy \$30 instead of \$15 hats, and she finds her husband drifting away through lack of domestic comfort, then I think she should shake the job and anchor her husband."
