

DEVASTATED  
RHEIMS MECCA  
OF PARISIANS

Paris, April 4—Early every morning every day of the week, excursions start from Paris, going, in a several direction, northeast. Their purpose is to show to the traveller, almost exclusively to the foreign traveller what remains of the region that five years ago contained, Albert Arras, Lens, St. Quentin, Chateau Thierry, Rheims and Verdun.

More than any other single nationality Americans are to be found on these excursions.

Because of its heroic resistance, its religious interest and, perhaps more important in this matter its accessibility Rheims is the commonest objective. An hour's ride brings the traveller to the city.

## Whole Streets Without Roofs.

In the city there is street after street of houses without roofs, with only three walls with two or one or none at all. And in some places are to be seen roofs that are supported by a mere shred of wall, distributed on several sides and threatening to fall at any moment.

The station, by unusual good luck has been only half destroyed. It is still serviceable, and is undergoing repairs, which should bring it to a normal condition within the next few months. But few if any of the other large public buildings have escaped destruction. The streets have been cleared, and there is no difficulty of circulation in the city.

Certain neighborhoods, despoiled or overlooked by the German gunners, are almost intact. In these sections and in the temporary quarters erected for shelter live one-half of the former population of 120,000. Those who possessed some modest property in the city are forced to return; those who are rich enough to live where they please and those whose only resource is the wage received for each day's labor have not returned, and probably never will.

As for the cathedral, much of its beauty is lost—some forever—but the building itself still stands and should continue to stand for hundreds of years. No less than 1,600 German shells exploded in the immediate vicinity of the cathedral, but by miraculous good fortune not a single one of the shells that actually pierced the walls exploded in the interior.

POINTERS ON  
SPRING PRUNING

If pruning is to be done this spring see that it is completed before the sap is flowing to any extent. Do not think it is necessary to take out a lot of wood from every tree. Much damage may be done by annual butchering. If the orchard has light annual pruning it will only be necessary to (1) remove all dead or broken branches (2) to head in any branches which may be too rangy (3) to remove cross branches or (4) to thin out where the tree has become absolutely too thick.

If the orchard is old and has been neglected; which is evidenced by lack of growth, and barren arms for many feet from the main trunk, a vigorous heading back of the top is necessary to force out new growth from which new fruit-producing wood can be selected.

Handle the young trees carefully. Do not make it a practice to head back ½ or 1-3 annually. Watch the crotchets and always keep one branch in the lead to avoid weak crotchets. Cut out where the variety produces a long rangy tree suppress the strongest growing branches the most and the weakest the least.

## Points to Remember.

In cutting back a main branch and one of its strong growing laterals do not cut both to the same length. Permit the main branch to retain the lead, otherwise two branches of equal dimensions will result which will produce a very weak crotch; a constant source of trouble.

Whenever given the option of selecting either a branch growing at a sharp angle to its parent or one growing almost at right angles, choose the latter—it will make a stronger crotch in future years.

Always cut back to a bud, cutting as close as possible without injuring the bud itself. By paying attention to the position of the bud one can do much to decide the form the tree shall take.

Study each variety you are dealing with and adopt a system, most suited to its needs. Do not attempt to apply very hard and fast rules to your whole orchard.

It is not a question of how much pruning one can do, but how little one can do and still retain the desired shape, vigour and productiveness of the tree.
