TOURIST TRAFFIC

The following article from the Halifax Recorder on tourist traffic, while it has reference to the attractions of the sister province of Nova Scotia, applies with even greater force to New Brunswick:

"On the whole, the best paying traffic for this Province is the tourist traffic. A larger per cent. of the money received therefrom is clearer gain than any other business that can be carried on. It was once the case that those who came here from the States were just plain folks who wished to enjoy a quiet time at some country farm, with a comfortable bed and a plain sensible fare. This sort of tourist is now largely a thing of the past, and he has been succeeded by wealthier and more strenuous type—men and women who want the best of everything, who desire to have all the elegancies and refinements that can be supplied and are willing to pay for them, as well as for trips all over the Province either in their own or a hired car. To adequately meet this traffic the hotel accommodations will have to be extended and improved and a fuller programme of pleasures and sports be provided. And such things would pay, and pay well on the investment. The great road building campaign now being carried on throughout Nova Scotia will put this Province in a condition to encourage motor traffic to the uttermost, for good roads are among the greatest attractions which a country can offer to visitors from abroad. Nova Scotia is now well known to Americans and for many years citizens of the Great Republic have been spending their summer vacations here and a number of our valley and coast towns have fared well by them. The traffic we have had, however, is microscopically small compared to what this country can accommodate if the right steps were taken without loss of time. Switzerland, it is claimed by those who ought to know, sees some scores of millions of dollars change hands as a result of the annual tourist traffic. Of course we have no Alps with their snow-capped peaks and their snow-capped glaciers; neither are we placed right in the swirling centre of a densely populated continent; but we have beautiful valleys, countless beautiful lakes and streams, extensive forests, and a splendid seashore of a thousand miles or more in length with some of the finest beaches in the world. To the south of it also is a vast and wealthy population a large part of whose territory is afflicted with very hot summers with no thermal relief day or night."

New Brunswick has attractions for tourists and sportsmen which cannot be discounted by any province of Canada. It has a coast line which practically extends from Passamaquoddy Bay to Campbellton; it has some of the largest and finest rivers on the Atlantic seaboard; it has the largest lakes to be found in the Maritime Provinces; it has big game hunting and fishing galore; it has an ideal summer climate; it has splendid roads for the motorist; it has people who know how to entertain strangers and make them feel at home. New Brunswick has seen more visiting motorists this year than ever before in its history and next year it will see even a larger number.
