

CONVICTION UNDER AMENDED LIQUOR ACT

NO RECORD KEPT OF
SALES OF EXTRACTS

More Than Two and a Half
Ounces of "Jaky" Sold to
Same Person in One
Day.

The first conviction in Fredericton under the recent amendment to the Intoxicating Liquor Act 1916, limiting the quantity of extract or tincture which can be sold to one person in one day by any one dealer to two and a half ounces and requiring a record of sales to be kept, was made this morning in the police court.

Two charges were preferred by Chief of Police Finley one that a record was not kept and the other that more than two and a half ounces had been sold to the one person the same day. The offences were acknowledged and fines of ten dollars in each case were imposed.

Arose Out of Arrest.
The cases arose out of the arrest of a local man on a charge of drunkenness. Four bottles of Jamaica ginger were found in his pockets. He informed the police where he had made the purchase. Chief Finley visited the place today and was informed by the proprietor that no record of sales had been kept but that the stock of "jaky" was exhausted. Later the Chief was given reason to believe that the statement concerning the stock was incorrect.

Further Drop in Some Lines
This morning's wholesale reports show a decided drop in some lines particularly in nuts and nut products, the average decline in the price of these goods is from ten to twelve cents per pound. Macaroni also has fallen off. Sugar is unchanged here, but there is a slight drop in Dominion sugars. A few other commodities have a slightly increased price due to the increased freight rates.

Died at Victoria Hospital
The death of William Graham, of Zealand Station, occurred Saturday night at Victoria Hospital after a short illness. The deceased, who was sixty-six years of age, is survived by two sisters, Miss Martha Jane and Mrs. Elizabeth Sharp, and two brothers, Thomas and James, all of Lion's Head, Ontario. The remains were taken to Zealand station this morning via C. P. R., where interment will be made. The funeral service will be conducted by Rev. J. S. Sutherland.

Three Fire Alarms
At 7.45 Saturday night an alarm was rung in from box 31 at the corner of Queen and Regent Street, due to a fire reported to have been seen in the Burchill-Wilkinson building. The motor truck responded but no signs of a blaze could be found, neither could the party who rang in the alarm be located. About an hour later the motor truck responded to a still alarm due to a chimney fire at the home of F. W. Risteen in Smythe street. Another still alarm was occasioned yesterday at 10 a. m. by a car catching on fire on Woodstock Road in front of the D. S. C. R. hospital. Very little damage was done to the car.

COLT STOLEN AND HIDDEN IN SHED NEAR CITY

TAKEN AT 'GORNISH,
LIGHT OVERTOOK THIEF

Elbridge Bunker Owner Traced
Colt to Doak Station—
Search of Sheds Locat-
ed Animal.

A case of horse-stealing was reported to the Fredericton police Saturday, but the missing animal was located without the police acting in the case. Elbridge Bunker, of Rustagornish, reported to the Chief of Police Saturday that a yearling colt had been stolen from its pasture near his dwelling during Friday night. There was no chance of the animal having strayed as another colt in the same pasture was safe. The owner traced the animal as far as Doak station which is in the limits of the city of Fredericton, but there lost trace of it.

Search Advised
Chief Finley advised Mr. Bunker to retrace his steps and search all sheds and camps along the Wilsey Road on a chance that the colt had been concealed in one of them.

Found the Colt
This morning Chief Finley received a letter from Mr. Bunker to the effect that his search of the camps and sheds along the road had resulted in the location of the colt at a point not far from the city. The animal was tied by a halter. It is believed that the thief or thieves had reached that point by daylight and intended to return Saturday night and get the colt at the point where it was concealed.

Takes Position at Chatham
Horace P. Webb who has been a member of the staff of the Provincial Forestry Dept. for some time, has resigned his position and left this morning for Chatham where he will enter the employ of the J. B. Snowball Lumber Co. Mr. Webb was graduated by U. N. B. last May.

Buck Deer Broke Window
St. John Telegraph: A wild well-antlered buck of the forest took the edge off some of the Sunday quiet in the North End just before 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon and gave North-Enders demonstration of how rapidly one deer's hoof can step by another. The deer invaded the district by way of the wilds of Indian town and for part of the distance followed the middle of the street. The more people it met the more frightened it became until, when opposite the police station, a trolley car drove in sight. The deer was not accustomed to such monsters and frantically jumping from the street, he plunged across the sidewalk and into a grocery store window demolishing the glass. Pedestrians side-stepped and beat a retreat and were imitated by the terrified animal which was last seen heading for Fort Howe. The deer limped as it made its way up the heights, its shoulder having been cut, apparently by contact with the glass.

CHILD WELFARE CONVENTION AT THE CAPITAL

DR. MELVIN ATTENDED
FOR NEW BRUNSWICK

Extension of Child Welfare
Work Will Result—Var-
ious Departments Rep-
resented.

Dr. G. C. Melvin, Chief Health Officer of New Brunswick, has returned from Ottawa, where he was in attendance on the Child Welfare Convention for the Dominion. The convention was highly successful and it is believed will be followed by extension of Child Welfare in New Brunswick as well as other provinces of the Dominion.

Dr. Melvin states that the attendance at the convention was most representative. Delegates from all provinces were in attendance. The Federal Department of Health and the various Provincial Departments, also the Red Cross Society, Women's Institutes, the D. S. C. R. and other official and voluntary organizations.

A National Committee on Child Welfare was formed at the convention. This is temporary. A full executive will be formed later. This council will contain one member from each National Association in Canada interested in Child Welfare, in addition to four permanent representatives for each province for this voluntary societies.

AIR STATION ESTABLISHED AT THIS PLACE

Conference Held Saturday—
River-banks Will be Mark-
ed and Windstreamers
Placed in Position.

The city has authorized the establishing of an air station here and the matter was finally discussed at a conference Saturday during the short stay here of Major Breadner of the Dominion Air Board who was flying to Halifax. Capt. Wilson, the pilot of Major Breadner's machine, Mayor Reid and City Engineer McDowell, examined the for msent to the city by the Air Board when an application for a status of Air Station was made.

Major Breadner was able to explain and agree with the City Engineer, the position of white markings on the shores to guide the airmen in landing and pointed out the plan by which streamers must be hung to show the direction of the wind.

The cost will be comparatively small including only a license fee of ten dollars besides the cost of the markings and streamers.
