## JIMMY WILDE PUT K. O. ON MIKE ERTLE

English Flyweight Title Holder Made St. Paul Boxer Look Like Amateur—Gave Weight.

Milwaukee, Jan. 31.—Jimmy Wilde, flyweight champion boxer of England, knocked out Mike Ertle, St. Paul, early in the third round of a ten-round bout.

The blow that stopped Ertle was a right-hand blow to the jaw which followed a straight left to the face. Wilde was the first to land in the opening session. He peppered away with several straight lefts. Ertle got in some good right and left blows to head and body, but this apparently did not bother the Englishman.

In the second round Wilde scored with right and left blows to head and body at will and leaped away from anything dangerous offered by Ertle. The round ended with Wilde having much the advantage.

The Englishman waded in at a fast clip as the third opened offering rights and lefts to head and body without damaging return, and at the end of about a minute in the final session Wilde caught the St. Paul man with a stiff right to the jaw. Ertle's hands dropped to his side and a second later he reeled fell to the canvas and was counted out.

Wilde weighed 108½ pounds and Ertle 115 at 3 p. m.

## MARYSVILLE SLOW AT MONCTON

The Moncton Transcript was not favorably impressed with the showing Marysville made against the Victorians in the railway city. It has the following:

"The game was particularly ragged when the Vics began to show some speed. The Nashwaak town goal tender was out of his net too much and thus allowed the local boys an opportunity to slam in goal after goal. At the outset of the game, it was imminent that "sure death" awaited the visitors as they showed up small on the ice and few of their men were fast skaters in the brush work. The local team played a winning game and slammed in four counters in the first period before the Marysville boys had time to "think that they were in the Arena." Their lone goal was chalked up by E. Wade in the opening of the play, and it was a fluke. George Carroll at point was quite effective last night and played all around the visitors playing a very clean game but when he settled down he got his man and following this, the puck also. Harold Carroll at Cover made several individual rushes from end to end of the rink, carrying the rubber for many tallies for his team which Bidlake failed to stop.

"None of the periods were fast. Moncton had the pleasure of setting the pace, but she had the Nashwaak team skated off their feet, so took it easy."

## JOHNSON TO TRY COMEBACK IF ALLOWED

Mexico City, Jan. 31.—Jack Johnson former heavyweight pugilistic champion of the world, plans to return to the United States at once to face charges pending against him in Chicago, Ill., according to a letter shown the Associated Press yesterday by Johnson. The former champion is confident he can arrange legal difficulties in time to fight Jack Dempsey before the latter meets Georges Carpentier of France, and asserts Dempsey must meet him before he can claim the world's championship.

Jack Johnson was tried in Chicago early in 1913 on charges of having violated the Mann "White Slave" law and, being convicted, was sentenced to a year's imprisonment in the Federal penitentiary at Leavenworth, Kas. Johnson appealed but before the case was argued before the higher court he forfeited his bail bond of \$15,000 by fleeing from his home near Chicago to Montreal. Late in June, 1913 he sailed for Europe and has not been on American soil since that time.

**Unconditional Surrender**  
Chicago, Jan. 29.—"Unconditional surrender" is the only basis on which local Federal officials will treat with Jack Johnson negro pugilist. This announcement was made today by Dist. Atty Charles F. Clyne, after reading the Associated Press dispatch from Mexico City to the effect that Johnson planned to return to the United States and face his penitentiary sentence for violation of the Mann Act. Johnson fled to Europe in 1913 while out on bail.

Johnson was indicted on a charge of paying the railroad fare of a woman from Pittsburgh to Chicago. He was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary and fined \$1000.

## SUCCESS OF THE VICTORY LOAN

Said a Canadian bank president recently:

In November last the Canadian Government issued its sixth War Loan, the money being required for purposes connected with the transition from war to peace. The Minister of Finance, Sir Henry Drayton, again asked for a minimum of \$300,000,000, and the total subscriptions received were \$676,242,790, almost as much as subscribed to the previous loan. The Minister of Finance, and the country itself, are to be congratulated most heartily upon this new demonstration of the financial strength of Canada. There was a large reduction in the number of subscribers, the total number being 789,532, as compared with 1,400,557 in the case of the 1918 loan, so that the average amount subscribed was considerably larger being \$357, against \$610. It is interesting to note, as showing the popularity of the Victory Loans among small subscribers, that in the case of the 1917 loan \$100,300,000, and in the case of the 1918 loan \$104,500,000, was issued in \$50 and \$100 bonds. The corresponding figures for the 1919 loan are not yet available, and owing to the reduction in the number of subscribers the total will probably not be so great but it is evident that about \$300,000,000 of the last three loans has been obtained in this way.

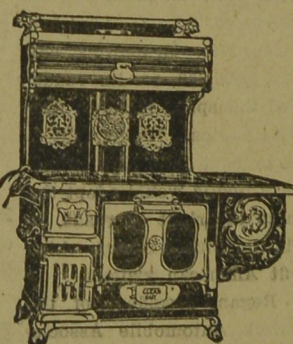
