

OHIO IS LOOKED UPON AS THE PIVOT OF THE NATION

Is Sure to Have the President No Matter Which Way the Election Goes—Both Candidates are Newspaper Men—Senator Harding Extends His Congratulations to His Opponent, Governor Cox.

Marion, Ohio, July 8.—With the announcement that Gov. James M. Cox had been nominated for President by the Democrats, Ohio awoke today to a new and if possible, increased appreciation of its political importance. "Pivot of the nation," "Battleground of 1920" and "Sure to win whoever loses" were some of the phrases descriptive of the high estate to which Buckeye-dom is raised by reason of having both nominees for President, residents of cities less than two hours apart.

But whatever excitement may have been caused elsewhere in this State which has been called the headquarters of all politics the Harding headquarters in Marion was immune. While the political speculators forecast a great personal contest between the Republican Senator and the Democratic Governor, the authorized declaration from Senator Harding's offices was that there will be no change in plans.

It will continue to be a front porch campaign, a campaign distinctly of parties and not of personalities in which both the bitterness of local partisanship and the asperities of individual ambition will be minimized.

Congratulates Cox

Senator Harding, instantly upon

learning this morning of Gov. Cox's nomination, took the first step to inject the element of cordiality into the campaign by wiring a message of congratulation to Gov. Cox that had the intimacy and warmth of personal neighborliness. He said:

"I recall a much remarked cartoon that portrayed you and me as newsboys contending for the White House delivery. It seems to have been prophetic. As an Ohioan and a fellow publisher, I congratulate you on your victory."

Not only does Ohio get both Presidential nominees, but the newspaper profession likewise wins the honors of both parties. Gov. Cox is publisher of the Dayton News and the Springfield News, while Senator Harding conducts the Marion Star. They have been personal friends for many years though their contacts have been more frequent since 1912 when Gov. Cox was first elected to the first office in the State. During and since the war, when many matters of vital State interest demanded their official co-operation, they have worked together on terms of the utmost understanding.

MAKING FOOD COSTS POLITICAL QUESTION

New York, July 12.—Twelve indignant women and three sympathetic men gathered Saturday around a small truckload of vegetables at the Commodore and decided that the only way to reduce the high cost of food is to make it a political question. The garden truck served as a table decoration for the indignation luncheon and to remind them that they had come there to discuss how to increase production and the farmers' profits and how to reduce the cost of distribution.

Neal H. Strome of Walden, representing the New York State Food Problem Association, who is a real farmer suggested that they organize half a million women in New York city and that 250,000 farmers will join them in starting a campaign for cheaper food. "We farmers raise the food, but when it comes to distributing it you people down here do a lot of talking, but that's all," said Mr. Strome. "You're nothing but a lot of children. And you are going to be hungry children pretty soon if you don't get busy and send a man to the Governor's chair who is pledged to give the farmer a fair deal."

WILL PROBE SARATOGA VICE

Albany, July 10.—Acting Gov. Harry Walker today ordered an extraordinary grand jury empanelled at Ballston Spa on Tuesday July 13, to begin an investigation of charges that "notorious gambling houses are in full operation" in Saratoga and that county and city officials are guilty of misconduct or neglect of duty.

Attorney General Charles D. Newton announced at the same time that he had acted upon the suggestion of the Acting Governor and appointed Wyman S. Bascom, District Attorney of Washington county, to supersede Charles B. Andrus, District Attorney of Saratoga county, as a special prosecuting officer to aid the grand jury.

Charges that Saratoga is being run wide open were presented by the Chamber of Commerce of that city. Affidavits submitted to the Acting Governor set forth that from ten to fifteen gambling houses were open during the last racing season and that other resorts were permitted to conduct their traffic without interference by the Saratoga officials. Well known gamblers from New York run the games, it is charged.

It is further charged that Jules Forman and George Remo, who were arrested in gambling raids last autumn were not prosecuted, although indicted. The two men were arrested recently in New York and are awaiting trial. The affidavits filed with the Executive state that the city and county officials have made no effort to suppress crime.

MISUSE OF THE DAY OF REST

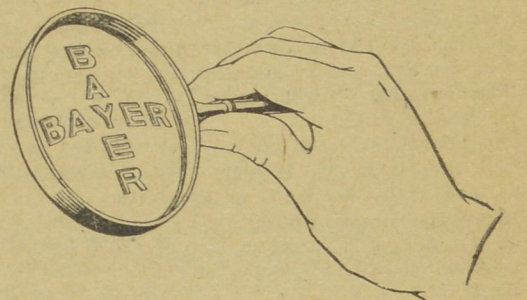

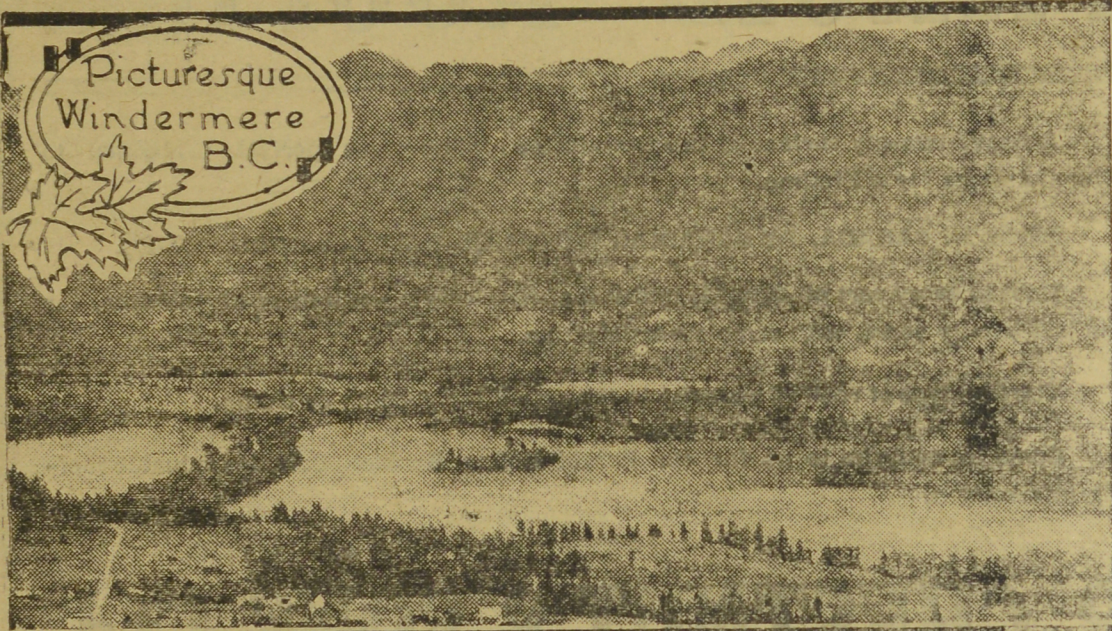

Lovely Regions in the Canadian Rockies



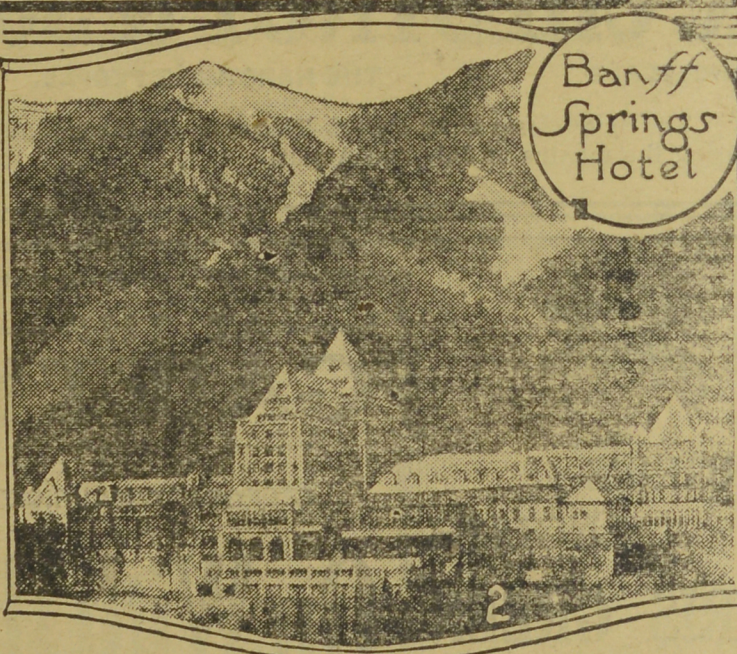
If the beauty of the Canadian Rocky Mountains, north of the line between the Dominion and the United States, is not the grandest in the world it is certainly lovely as any anywhere, and it is the loveliest on the American continent. The glory of the European Alps is dimmed by the towering snow clad peaks of the Rockies. Travellers on the Canadian Pacific Railway from Calgary, through Banff, Lake Louise, Field and Glacier on to the Pacific Coast view a land in which they feel themselves transferred to an earthly paradise.

The gigantic heights, the snow capped peaks, the rugged boulders, the pines growing in the sand and rock crevices up as far as the snow line are amongst the most impressive features of the Rocky Mountains. How the builders of the C.P.R. ever were able to excavate their way through this region is one of the wonders of the world.

Visitors whose time is limited should anyway explore a portion of the Rocky Mountain region and stay off at Banff and Lake Louise, points where the C.P.R. has built luxurious hotels. Besides, good roads radiate from these spots and automobiles or ponies can be engaged to bring the tourist right into the heart of the best scenic regions.

Banff is situated at an altitude of 4,521 feet in the Canadian National Park. This Park is a natural reservation of 5,732 square miles embracing part of the Bow river valley, numerous small rivers and several towering mountain ranges. Banff National Park is the largest in the world. Cascade Mountain, 9,825 feet high, looks down on Banff Springs Hotel, and the hotel looks down on the Bow river valley. Buffalo still roam in the Park, and the Zoological Garden contains many Canadian wild animals. Banff Museum possesses many valuable objects of curiosity. In the Museum there is a visitors' book in which a space is provided for remarks on Banff. Looking over the book, one is interested enough to take a note of some of the opinions on Banff. Here are a few:

Seaplanes are employed to give visitors to Banff unusual thrills this year. They are being used in preference to aeroplanes because the lakes in the mountains offer landing and take-off stations for them, whereas such facilities are not available for the ordinary machines. The lake at Banff has been secured as the base of operations, and flights over the mountains and to other isolated lakes are projected.

The lake known as Lake Louise is a small sheet of water surrounded by mountains on all sides but one, and on this open side stands the Chateau Lake Louise looking out on the lake and the heights above. The water in Lake Louise at different periods of the day puts on the most wonderful hues of green which baffle description. Some of the mountains at Lake Louise are Saddleback 7,893 feet high, Fairview 9,000; Leftroy 11,220; Victoria 11,355; Whyte 9,776; Big Beehive 7,430. Swiss guides conduct mountain climbing parties at Lake Louise. Ponies are largely used for climbing the trails on the mountain sides. From the Chateau Lake Louise it is a nice climb to the Lakes in the

Clouds, and this climb can be easily done on foot by any athlete lady or gentleman. Among the Lakes in the Clouds one may enjoy tea in the comfortable log cabin erected for the comfort of the climbers.

There is opened to tourists this summer a new resort of rustic design in the Canadian Rockies on the sandy beaches of Lake Windermere, the loveliest warm water lake in British Columbia. Lake Windermere is situated about 170 miles south of the Main Line of the Canadian Pacific and is reached from the main line at Golden, or from Colwall on the Crow's Nest, the station being Lake Windermere.

The scenery of this region combining as it does, pastoral softness with rugged mountain grandeur will attract visitors from all parts and become a favorite playground. The summer visitor will find here everything that he could wish for—bathing, boating, riding on horseback, golf, automobile, fishing and big game hunting in season. The Canadian Pacific has created a number of cabins fully equipped with every convenience of the modern home. An auto road from Banff leads to the course of construction by the Dominion Parks Board.
