

DAILY SERVICE ON THE VALLEY RAILWAY

Passenger Trains to Run on Week
Days on the Same Schedule as at
Present—Through Sleeper to
Quebec Daily Except
Sunday.

With the time changes on Canadian National Lines effective June 27th the Passenger Train on the Valley Railway will run every week day on the same schedule as at present, viz. No. 47 will leave St. John at 12.55 noon (eastern time) and reach Fredericton at 4.30 p. m. leaving for Centreville at 5.00 p. m.

No. 48 will leave Centreville at 6.00 a. m. arriving in Fredericton at 10.00 a. m. and leaving for St. John at 10.30 a. m.

There will be a mixed train service from St. John to Fredericton on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday, and from Fredericton to St. John on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. A mixed train will also go to Centreville on Monday, Wednesday and Friday and arrive from Centreville on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday.

The through sleeping car for Quebec via McGivney and the Trans-continental will run daily except Sunday, the trains between McGivney and Quebec having been put on daily schedule.

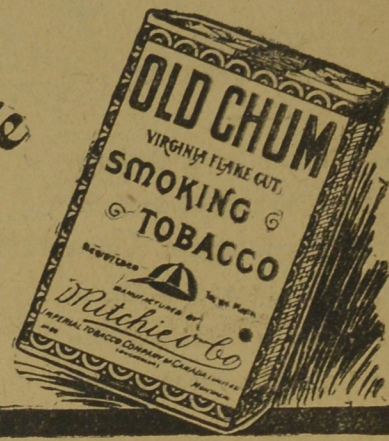

The result puts Devon and the Oldtimers abreast in the league standing at the head of the second division teams. Marysville did not come down to play the Imperials although the local team rather ex-

pected that the game scheduled for Monday night would be played.

Old Ones Dug Out.

Although Fredericton City has the name of the Oldtimers, Devon deserved the name last evening with Dick Malloy on second, Lassie Brewer in centrefield and Tank Hughes behind the bat. Shields again was on the mound for Devon and though erratic worked well. Fredericton deserved but one run, errors helping the others. Shields was found for only three hits, in six innings and struck out eight men. At that he was not well supported.

At the bat Devon had the edge on their opponents hitting W. Kenney for five safe ones, two of them two baggers.

Oldtimers Off in Fielding.

The Oldtimers were off in their fielding, seven juicy errors being chalked up. Bob Chappell was a notable exception in the infield. For a player who was not used for first of the season he is doing well at second base for City. He had one double play all to himself. W. Kenney pitched a good game for the Oldtimers and also had two assists. Errors behind him lost the game.
