CANADIAN SHIPBUILDERS TO GET FOREIGN BUSINESS

Government Assistance is Likely to be Forthcoming—Minister of Finance Gives Notice of an Important Resolution—France Has Been in the Market for Ships for Some Time—Terms of Payment to be Arranged.

Ottawa, June 22—If the government's plan for the encouragement of shipbuilding in Canada becomes incorporated in legislation it is asserted here that enough foreign business will come to Canadian shipyards to keep them busy for the next two years and a half. The fact that France has been in the market for ships enough to constitute a new mercantile marine, has been referred to time and again, but hitherto the objection has been that it was difficult to arrange credits and induce France to abide by the fortunes of the exchange market when the time comes to pay up. France, it is said, is now willing to pay in gold when interest and capital sums fall due or at the current rate of exchange.

It is believed that a large credit association with which Sir Henry Pellatt's name has been associated has arranged for money from New York to help finance the business.

The government's part is outlined in the resolution of which notice has just been given by the minister of finance. By this resolution twenty-five per cent of the price of any vessel more than 3000 tons would be paid by the purchaser, that is by France in the case under consideration. The shipbuilder and the purchaser would make their own arrangements as to terms of

payment for another twenty-five per cent.

The remaining fifty per cent would be paid by promissory notes drawn by the purchaser in favor of the shipbuilder and endorsed by the government of Canada, the first of such notes would have to be paid at a date not less than twenty-one months after the time the contract was entered into, and the last note not later than fifty-seven months after such time.

The resolution referred to says specifically that in the case of vessels being built for British account a mortgage on the vessel for the full amount of the notes so endorsed by the minister of finance would have to be registered in Canada. The vessel would also be insured and the registry and insurance would remain permanent until after the mortgage was fully paid up.

A special clause in the resolution deals with the French case, as follows: "If the vessel is being built for an alien and the provisions above mentioned with respect to mortgaging the vessel cannot conveniently be complied with, such security for the amount of the said promissory notes endorsed by the minister of finance shall be furnished by the purchaser as may be approved by the governor-in-council."

The twenty-five per cent cash required from the purchaser of a vessel may be paid as follows: Ten per cent or more in cash when the contract is entered into, enough to make the payment twenty per cent or more within six months time, and then the balance before another three months have elapsed over the half year period.

The proponents of this plan claim that it will avoid most of the difficulties attending former extensions of credit to foreign countries, that twenty-five per cent cash comes to Canada within nine months, that another twenty-five per cent will come according to arrangements between the shipbuilder and the foreign power or company purchasing and that the two to five year notes endorsed by the minister of finance will have ample security and that money loaned on them will come to Canada at once to develop Canadian industries. The suggestion has been made that Canada might ask as security or even payment for some of these the Islands of St. Pierre and Miquelon yet owned by France in the St. Lawrence, but this has not been given any serious attention. So far as ships built for Canadian account are concerned the government would have a mortgage on every vessel and the payments would be made in the same way. It is the greatest attempt to finance an industry yet noted in Canadian history.

It has not escaped the notice of politicians here that some of the companies in the British Empire steel merger would benefit largely from the business accruing from the policy.

P. H. REED OF FT. FAIRFIELD STILL ALIVE

Inaccurate Report of His Death Published Here—Had a Paralytic Stroke but is Recovering.

The account of the death of P. H. Reed of Fort Fairfield, Me., which was published with circumstantial detail in a Fredericton newspaper this week, like that of the death of Mark Twain, was "grossly exaggerated." Last evening George Reed son of P. H. Reed telephoned W. W. O. Fenety in this city a relative and stated that his father had had a stroke of paralysis about a week previously but was recovering. He asked to have the report of the death which had received "a certain degree of publicity," contradicted.

Mr. Reed is a well known resident of Aroostook County and is known in New Brunswick particularly through his connection with harness racing, his stable of horses usually being represented at the meets held in New Brunswick. His numerous friends regret that his health is not what they would like to see but are pleased that the report of his death is slightly premature.

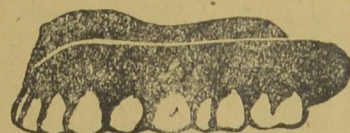

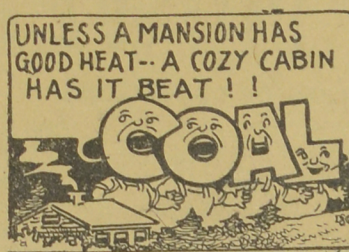
