THE BUDGET DEBATE.

The budget debate is dragging on in the Legislature and it looks as if it would be the end of next week before the House gets down to the real work of supply. So far the debate has taken a high tone, and while members of the opposition, who must do something to make a showing, have indulged in criticism, they have not been able to formulate any charges of wrong doing against members of the administration. Their arguments have been easily swept away by the members who have spoken on behalf of the government.

Yesterday Leader Murray was the chief performer on the opposition side, holding forth for nearly three hours. He indulged in a lot of criticism, but it was not of a constructive nature, and will carry little weight with the people who stop to compare things as they exist today with conditions which prevailed when Mr. Murray and his colleagues were at the helm. Until the opposition leader and his co-workers show repentance for the various crooked transactions which marked their administration of affairs they cannot expect the people to take any great amount of stock in their present day professions of lofty virtue and zeal for the public welfare. In other words, they have got to be born again before the people will take them seriously.

Others who contributed speeches to the debate yesterday were Mr. LeBlanc of Restigouche and Mr. Peck of Albert. Mr. LeBlanc is one of the ablest Acadians in public life in the Maritime province and never was he heard to better advantage than yesterday. He spoke with remarkable vigor and in addition to landing heavily on the vital spots of the opposition made an admirable defence of the government. The people of Restigouche have very reason to be proud of their clever young member.

Mr. Peck, the little joker from Albert kept the House in good humor for half an hour in an attempt to get back at the Provincial Secretary for having called in question his knowledge of finance. Mr. Peck is a private banker and seems to take as readily to stocks and bonds as a duck does to water. His criticism is usually of a harmless nature and his speech of yesterday was no exception.

Members of the opposition as at present constituted might talk from now until the crack of doom, but they will not be able to shake public confidence in the capable and business-like administration now in control of affairs. If Mr. Murray is well advised he will chuck the flow of oratory and allow the House to get down to the real business for which the session was called.

Mr. Michaud a clever young Acadian member from Madawaska delivered a good speech on the budget in the House on Tuesday. He made an effective reply to the diatribes of opposition speakers and praised the splendid work which is being accomplished by the government. As usual his address commanded close attention from both sides of the House.

They obtained a license here last Saturday and the ceremony was performed Sunday by the Rev. J. Whitcomb Brougher, pastor of the Temple Baptist Church.

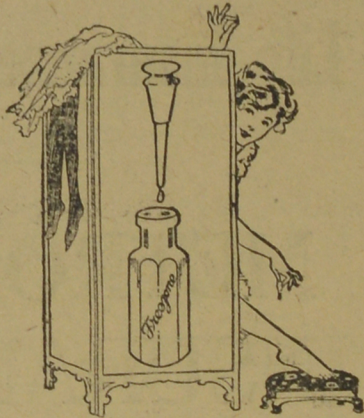
LUMBER LANDS DISPOSED OF

St. John, N. B., March 30—Valuable timber tracts along the St. Croix river, owned by H. F. Eafon & Sons, of Calais, have been sold to E. B. Draper, of Bangor. The transfer included 262,000 acres of timber lands at the headwaters, saw mills at Milltown wharf property at Calais and five sailing vessels. The transfer involves the sum of \$4,000,000.

It is understood that Mr. Draper will also take over 93,000 acres of timber lands in the Aroostook region. Several valuable water rights are included in the transaction. Years ago the Eaton firm was one of the best known in the lumber business but of late years its operations have not been conducted on so extensive a scale as formerly. The change in title will mean a revival in the lumber industry along the St. Croix, it is understood.

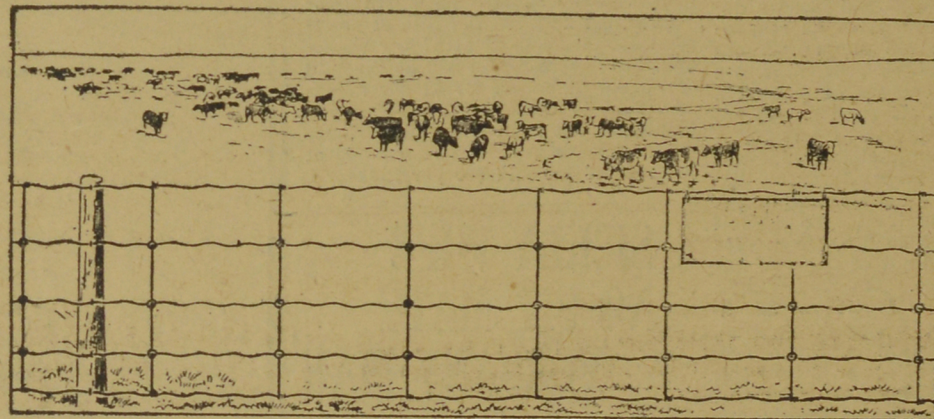

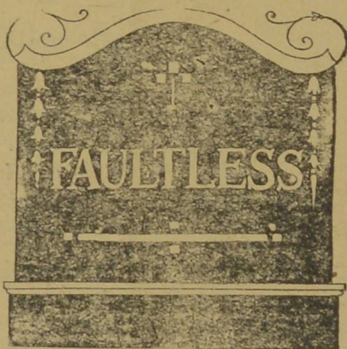
