BILL TO EXTEND THE VALLEY RAILWAY NORTH OF CENTREVILLE BEFORE THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY

Continued from Page One.

Assembly Chamber, March 31, 1920. The House met at three o'clock. MR. BURCHILL presented the report of the Committee on Standing Rules. In doing so he said it would greatly facilitate the work of the Committee if hon. members when presenting petitions would see to it that such petitions explained the object of the proposed legislation and why it was being sought. Many petitions did not contain the desired information. He would also suggest that hon. members retain duplicate copies of bills presented to the House. Notices of Enquiry were given as follows:

By MR. TAYLOR: As to expenditures on permanent roads in the Parish of St. Patrick, Charlotte County; also as to like expenses in the Parishes of St. George, Penfield and Le-preaux.

By MR. SMITH (Carleton): As to the disposition of fencing wire shipped from Florenceville.

By MR. TILLEY: As to whether it was the intention of the Government to request the New Brunswick Power Company to extend its line to Courtenay Bay; also as to whether it was the intention of the Government to share with the Federal Government the cost of maintaining a labor bureau in the Province.

HON. MR. SMITH introduced a Bill to amend an Act relating to the Town of Shediac.

MR. TILLEY introduced a Bill to enable Centenary Methodist Church, St. John, to issue debentures.

HON. MR. DUGAL introduced a Bill to enable the school trustees of the Parish of Madawaska to issue debentures.

MR. CAMPBELL introduced a Bill relating to the New Brunswick Power Company.

MR. SUTTON introduced a Bill to enable the Town of Woodstock to issue debentures; also a Bill to enable Agricultural Society No. 41 to issue debentures and to authorize the Town of Woodstock to endorse the same; also a Bill to enable the County of Carleton and Towns of Woodstock and Hartland to establish a Municipal Home, and also a Bill relating to the Tobique River Log Driving Company.

MR. CAMPBELL introduced a Bill to incorporate a St. Andrews Curling Club.

MR. HUNTER introduced a Bill to

amend the Act for the Establishment of a Municipal Home in York County.

HON. MR. FOSTER introduced a Bill to amend the Act respecting the St. John & Quebec Railway. He explained that it was to provide for the extension of the road north of Centreville, and for the continuance of the Board of Directors. When the bill came before the House in Committee he would make a statement with reference to the work of construction, the settlement made with contractors, the proposed extension, the state of litigation now pending, including a recent claim of A. R. Gould, and a statement on the position of the Government with respect to the Prudential Trust Co.

MR. CAMPBELL introduced a Bill to amend the Act relating to Street Pavements in St. John.

HON. MR. ROBINSON introduced three Bills to amend the Acts relating to the Town of Moncton and to authorize the School Trustees to issue debentures.

MR. CAMPBELL, with the unanimous consent of the House moved for suspension of Rule 78 to permit of the introduction of bills relating to the Church of England Institute and to St. John's Church, Oromocto.

MR. McGRATH introduced a Bill to authorize the School Trustees of Newcastle to issue debentures.

MR. CROCKET introduced a Bill relating to the Water Supply in the Town of Devon.

HON. MR. FOSTER introduced a Bill in further aid of the St. John & Quebec Railway. He explained that the bill would provide for the funding of the indebtedness incurred in construction which had not been previously funded.

HON. MR. FOSTER moved that the time for introducing private bills be further extended until April 7th. He said that it was the last motion that he would make for an extension of time.

HON. MR. BYRNE introduced a Bill relating to the Erection of Soldiers' Memorials. He said that many towns and municipalities were anxious to honor the memory of those who had sacrificed their lives during the late war. The bill empowered municipalities to make grants towards such memorials and to issue debentures on a two-thirds vote. There was the usual provision for the issuing of bonds and a sinking fund.

The Succession Duties

HON. MR. BYRNE introduced a bill to amend the Succession Duty act of 1915. He said that the present Act did not provide for a tax on estates under \$50,000 where the property went to a father, mother, husband, wife, son, daughter, son-in-law or daughter-in-law of the deceased; otherwise the tax was one and one-quarter per cent. On estates ranging from \$50,000 to \$200,000 the rate was 2½ per cent and it was five per cent on estates exceeding \$200,000. Under the proposed bill, estates to be exempted under class one would be reduced to \$25,000, and the rate on estates between \$25,000 and \$50,000 would be 1½ per cent. On estates ranging from \$50,000 to \$100,000 the rate would be 2½ per cent. On estates ranging from \$100,000 to \$150,000 the rate would be 5 per cent, and would be graded up to \$1,000,000. When the value passing to one person alone in class one exceeded \$25,000, there would be an additional tax of ½ per cent on that amount; if it exceeded \$100,000 and was less than \$200,000 there would be a further tax of 1 per cent, with higher additional taxes on larger amounts. It was proposed in class two to include any lineal descendant or ancestor of deceased except those mentioned in class one; class two also included any brother or sister of deceased or any child or grandchild of such brother or sister, or any brother or sister of the father or mother of the deceased and any child or grandchild of such last mentioned brother or sister. If the property passed to persons in that class and the aggregate value of the estate exceeded \$10,000 and was less than \$50,000 the tax would be 5 per cent; if it exceeded \$50,000 and was less than \$100,000 the tax would be 10 per cent, and 12 per cent would be imposed if it exceeded \$100,000. If the value of the property passing to one person in class two exceeded \$10,000 and was less than \$50,000, there would be a further tax of ½ per cent. Class three would embrace those not in Classes 1 and 2. If the aggregate value of property in that class exceeded \$5,000 and was less than \$50,000 the tax would be 0 per cent; from \$50,000 to \$500,000 it would be 15 per cent, and if it exceeded \$500,000 and was less than \$1,000,000 the rate would be 17½ per cent. If more than \$1,000,000 it would be 20 per cent. He said that the provision of the old law which imposed a double tax on property going to persons outside the province would be retained. The bill provided exemption from duties on property willed to charitable, religious or educational institutions, provided the bequests were carried out in the province.

MR. BAXTER moved for the suspension of Rule 78 to admit of the introduction of a Bill respecting the paving of streets and sidewalks in St. John. He said that the matter had been taken up by a group of citizens, but they had only published the notice once each in the four daily papers. The Common Council had since taken hold of the matter and it was proposed that any action to be taken under the Bill would be based on the result of a plebiscite to be held in conjunction with the civic elections.

MR. MICHAUD moved for the suspension of Rule 78 to allow the introduction of a Bill to enable the Town of Edmundston to issue debentures for permanent streets and sidewalks.

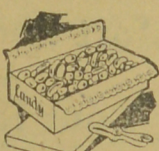
