

The latest Spring fur is a rather wonderful rabbit-skin which is practically shaved; that is to say, it is cut so close that it looks like plush or Teddy Bear cloth. This is a very attractive fur, but unhappily quite expensive—because it is a novelty. It is dyed all sorts of unexpected colors but is at its best in beige, smoke-grey, deep cream and dark blue. As the spring season advances there may be a further introduction of strange furs—at least strange looking furs, for in truth every known animal possessing a fur coat has already been called into service. We are promised a season of "summer furs." It is hinted that our summer frocks will be trimmed with bands of ermine, mole and beaver.

Appliques of black velvet make an attractive trimming. They may be arranged as a border around the hem of a Russian blouse, or to ornament the deep collar and cuffs of a waist and they look particularly well on such materials as georgette or crepe de Chine. Little fruit or leaf shapes simple petals tiny squares circles or ovals, according to fancy are cut out of black velvet and tacked in position on the garment. The appliques are arranged in liens or groups. Petals for instance are often seen grouped together in floral effect, while squares are set together in checkerboard effect, or arranged in single rows.

The new Spring tailor-mades are quite charming. Nearly all the best models have youthful outlines; nearly all show long waists. For serge and cloth suits the latest idea is the fitted top and the wide hem—the latter achieved in many different ways. Some of the new coats have the tops closely fitted to just below the normal waistline, and from there the material is finely gathered over the hips—at either side—and left comparatively plain back and front. This idea is largely applied to the ultra-long coat, which reach to within four inches of the hem of the dress. The same idea is carried out in the wool-backed satin for three-quarter length. The Paris tailors are making fitted coats which do not look unduly tight; they mould the figure gracefully showing every line and curve and yet they are far removed from the skin-tightness of lesser artists.

LITTLE THINGS IN THE KITCHEN.

A pair of scissors is indispensable in your kitchen.

One housekeeper insists on using scissors in preparing grapefruit for the table. She scorns the usual grapefruit knife. Instead she takes a pair of rather thin, sharp scissors. Having cut the grapefruit in half she cuts the white dividing tissue neatly down with the scissors between the sections. She then cuts the centre out of the half, and then using a thin silver knife it is a simple matter to pull up the dividing white tissues.

Often you need pins in the kitchen. It may be you want to pin up your sleeves or pin an apron which has lost its button. Then you may need it to fasten a small package, and if you have to go upstairs to get a pin from a bedroom time is wasted.

Light disks of wood are a convenience to have to set hot pots and saucepans on. They are really more convenient than asbestos pads for most purposes and may be washed quite readily. They may be bought, or you can use the tops of rounds boxes in which figs or Camembert cheese has come. Just take off the rim of the wooden cover and you have the flat little disk of wood all ready. Then these nice smooth pieces of wood are convenient if you want to mince a little onion or parsley.

nection with the Department of Public Works criticism had been offered concerning the collection of the Motor Vehicle Tax, the statement being made that the commission paid was 10 per cent. Out of a total of \$73,000, \$884 had been expended for aluminum seals, \$3,106 for motor cycle and dealers' tags, and \$1200 for postage. This made a total of \$5,000 out of \$8,000. The percentage was greatly reduced, in fact not more than 6 per cent, which he considered a small charge for collection.

The hon. member for Carleton had criticized the Crown Lands administration. He was an expert in that connection and he (Michaud) would not attempt to follow him. Personally he would much prefer to leave the administration of that department in the hands of the present government than in those of the former administration. The hon. member had said that the stumpage rate was not high enough, and also that the lumber operators were making enormous profits. His (Michaud's) knowledge of the lumber operators, his hon. friend however, had carefully avoided making any mention of that. As a matter of fact the price of lumber was practically double after it had passed through a factory. In connection with the agitation for an increased stumpage rate it might be proposed to impose a special tax upon lumber manufacturers. He had no doubt that this hon. friend would be willing to pay that tax since he was so conscientious. He (Michaud) believed that the treatment which the stumpage question had received in the Press and in the House would work injury to the province. The smaller operators might have their credit damaged, and in that manner injury be worked to the province.

Much had been said concerning the position of the province in Confederation. He must admit that the position was not so good as it had been fifty years before. For this state of affairs all were responsible. There was but one way to remedy this and that was by broadening our views, not only from a provincial angle, but also from

a Dominion viewpoint. He would certainly concur in any movement which might be made by the government or members of this House, with a view of taking to Ottawa the claims of the province, in an effort to impress upon the minds of those men who seem to have turned their backs on the Maritime Provinces. There also was a constitutional way of dealing with the matter. That was by an increase in population and the development of our

natural resources. The government was doing much toward the protection of wild life, but it also should give attention to getting people back to the land and the keeping of the younger generation on the land. It was said that in some parts of the province that could not be accomplished, but in certain other parts it could. New land could be opened for settlement. There was great opportunity for effort along this line. The Federal government was continually offering inducements to immigrants in New Brunswick. But the young people also should be kept in the province, for they were its greatest asset. As far as the hon. Minister of Public Health was concerned it was almost useless for him to offer anything in the way of praise, as hon. members of the opposition had paid him the greatest compliment in not finding any fault with his department so far. The hon. minister of health had acquitted himself well in the elaborate speech which he had delivered, and which had given the House much information. He was to be congratulated upon his efforts to improve the standard of health in the province.

MR. PECK moved the adjournment of the debate.

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION.

Public notice is hereby given that application will be made at the next session of the Legislative Assembly, by the City of Fredericton, for the passage of a bill or bills for the following purposes:

(a) To amend the City of Fredericton Assessment Act, 1907, and in particular section 46 thereof, so as to provide that tax notices may be mailed to ratepayers or delivered personally, as the City Treasurer may decide, under the direction of the Finance Committee.

(b) That the said Assessment Act be further amended so as to provide that all females assessed on income or property, real or personal, within the City of Fredericton, and who shall have paid their taxes within the time limited thereby by the said Act, shall be entitled to vote at City elections.

(c) For authority to make a grant for a Memorial in memory of soldiers who lost their lives during the Great War, either by way of assessment or by borrowing, as the City Council may decide.

(d) For authority to grant to the John Palmer Company, Limited, exemption from taxation for a period of twenty years from and including the year 1920; free sewerage for the same period of time under such limitation as the City Council may decide, and water for all purposes at the fixed rate of ten cents per thousand gallons, for the said period of twenty years.

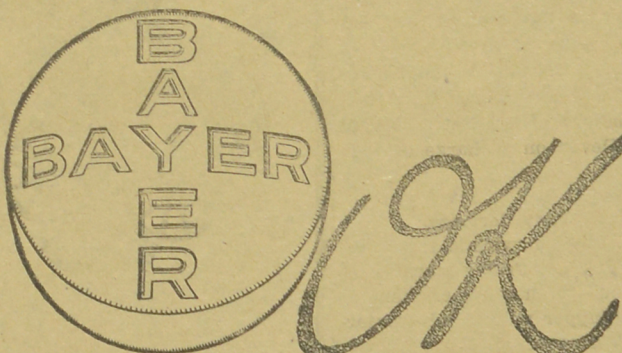
