MILLTOWN WALKED AWAY WITH  
SATRDAY'S GAME AT MARYSVILLE

Score in Baseball Match at the Nashwaak Town was 12 to 5—

The Visitors from the Border Batted Their Way to Victory,  
But Were Helped by Marysville's Errors—A Strong Wind  
Bothered the Outfielders.

Marysville, Aug. 21—Milltown walked away with the first of a series of ball games with Marysville by beating the home team 12 to 5 here this afternoon. The game started out well for Marysville which took a lead in the first inning and held it until the sixth inning when Milltown took a lead. In the ninth the visitors scored five runs ending all doubt of the result.

The heavy hitting of Milltown against Anderson and the poor fielding of Marysville were features. For five innings the game was as good as any one would want to see but Marysville then appeared to crack under the strain making four errors. The sixth was another bad one for the home team, three errors being made.

Johnson of the Imperials and J. Bolster and Wheeler of the Y. M. C. A. played with Marysville. Bolster and Wheeler are boxmen but neither was sent in to relieve Anderson who stayed in and was hammered for seventeen safe ones by Milltown.

Wheeler slammed out a three-base hit over the right field fence in the eighth. It might have started a Marysville batting rally but the base-runner tried to stretch it into a home-run going past the catcher and getting caught at the plate.

Milltown proved a hard slugging team with lots of pep in the field. "Baldy" Moffatt supplied much of that. It was a strong finishing team. The first of the game was all Marysville.

A very strong wind was blowing during the game which accounted for misjudging in the outfield in many cases. The box score:—

FRANCE SUFFERS  
THROUGH LACK  
OF DIPLOMACY

Paris, Aug. 21—Anatole France, declared today that France's lack of diplomacy is alienating her former allies and rapidly placing her in a position of friendlessness and diplomatic isolation. "What have we done to our allies," he asks. "What has become of the friendships of a year ago, our superb attitude of warlike order, are we tired of them all? America suffered from our sarcasms, first, when she brought forth a political doctrine that failed to agree with ours. Then we quarrelled over our Latin sister; following that we alienated the new oriental states. Then scared by financial embarrassments and difficulties in applying the terms of the badly made treaty we have gotten into the greatest possible discord with England. Recognition of Gen. Wrangel makes the situation terrible.

What remains of the English-French entente after this diplomatic stroke—nothing, we are alone!"
