## ARCHBISHOP SAYS HE IS NOT HOSTILE TO ENGLAND

Australian Prelate Now in the Old Country Gives Out an Interview—Declares He is for Peace and Desires Friendship Between England and Ireland—A Search Made of the Homes of Sinn Feiners.

London, Aug. 22—Archbishop Mannix, of Australia, in an interview here, said he desired to make it plain that he was not hostile to Great Britain or to England. "I have no hostility to England," said he, "or to any other country. What I desire with all my heart is peace everywhere, and particularly peace and friendship between England and Ireland. I hope to see it. But it can only come in one way, and that is by the way of justice to Ireland."

"I attribute a charge that I am hostile to England to the misrepresentations of English newspaper correspondents in America. I made dozens of speeches there in which I laid down that very principle, that peace between England and Ireland could be obtained by justice to Ireland, and in no other way, and that I desired peace. Not a word so far as I can find of this essential part of my argument was even published here. But when I went on as I was bound to do to comment on the injustice done by England to Ireland it was carefully selected passages from this part of the argument that were telegraphed. I did not desire hostility between Britain and the United States. But the way to friendship with America, as with Ireland, is by doing Ireland justice. From this argument also the correspondents have selected only the passages that suited them. I expect to visit Rome some time in the fall. At the present time I have no programme, but I hope to visit my home land."

### Hopes For Moderation.

Rome, Aug. 22—The Irish College here has been notified that Archbishop Mannix, Australian, will be a guest during the prelate's visit to Rome next October.

It is authoritatively said here that the British government does not desire to prevent Archbishop Mannix visiting Rome, but on the contrary has sued its influence with the Vatican to hasten his arrival there, hoping that his visit to the Pope may result in moderating his aggressive anti-British sentiments.

### Message to Irish.

Dublin, Aug. 23—Through the Freeman's Journal, Archbishop Mannix, of Australia, has addressed the following message to the Irish people:

"I appeal to the Irish people to be calm and firm under the insult offered them and me. Ireland can afford to be patient for, though she is suffering much, her cause is almost won. The recent 'English naval victory' has but added fuel to the flames which it was meant to extinguish."

### Houses Were Searched.

Dublin, Aug. 22—The homes of Arthur Griffith and other prominent Sinn Feiners were ransacked Friday night for private papers.

The act for restoration of order in Ireland gives the authorities wide power to suppress disorders in the country. It will set up new tribunals for the trial of all crimes and offenses under the defense of the realm act, which in effect means court martial. In the case of capital offenses provision is made for modification in the court so as to bring in the civil element as well as the military. The act also gives the military and police wider powers for apprehending suspected persons.

The inability of the government authorities to arrest criminals and obtain

juries in south and west Ireland caused the breakdown of the crown courts it was explained at the time the bill was under discussion, and forced the government to resort to the juryless system.

The crown will appoint the high justice and other court officials who will sit only in Dublin to obviate the possibility of attack if court sessions were held in remote localities.

Hotels catering to the tourist trade are receiving letters demanding that they refuse to shelter "enemies" of Ireland. The proprietress of the famous Wooden Bridge Hotel in the Wicklow mountains received such a letter, but refused to recognize the demand unless it bore the stamp of "the Irish republic."
