

EGG PRICES ARE FIXED

London, Dec. 1.—Profiteering in eggs during the coming winter has been tipped in the bud by the Food Ministry, which has fixed the maximum price for new-laid eggs at six pence each, about nine cents in American money now. The farmers have had visions of the price to eighteen or twenty cents. As a matter of fact it was proved by an egg-laying test last winter that eggs can be produced at a cost of a fraction over four cents each. Thus the six penny limit would allow a good margin of profit.

There is some uncertainty as to the precise definition of a "new-laid" egg, as distinct from a "fresh" egg, but an expert gives the opinion that an egg may reach the age of twenty-eight days and still be "fresh" in the trade sense.

THREW LIGHTED LAMP AT THIEVES

Atlantic City, N. J., Dec. 11.—Three masked safeblowers who tonight broke into the Postoffice at Port Republic near here, were routed with a lighted oil lamp hurled at them by Mrs. Amanda Blake, the postmaster's wife. Their clothing were set afire, and thoroughly bewildered by the unexpected fiery shower, the safeblowers fled precipitately and escaped in an automobile. The little store also caught fire, but the plucky woman put out the blaze before the firemen arrived.

Mrs. Blake was awakened by a crash of glass. Lighting the lamp in her bedroom, she dashed downstairs to a landing overlooking the safe, to see the masked trio at the door of the safe.

"Get out of here," she shouted defiantly at the robbers. Evidently they were slow in obeying the command, whereupon Mrs. Blake threw the lighted lamp with good effect.

FREE FUNERAL BY COMMUNE

Berlin, Dec. 11.—Free funerals is the latest Communistic novelty. The town of Schedewitz, in Saxony, offers its inhabitants all the necessities of death free of charge. These include coffin, clothes, professional treatment by local undertakers, grave digging and transportation on a truck to a cemetery.

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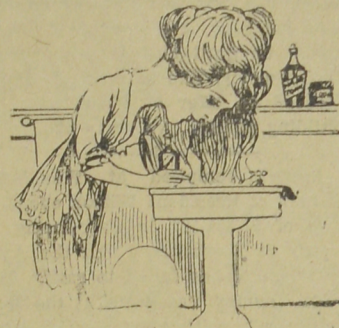

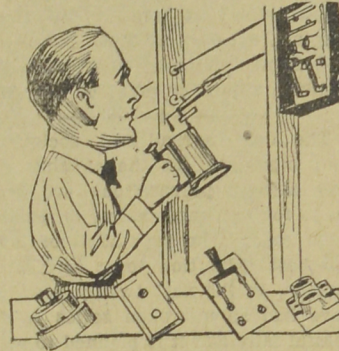

KING GEORGE HAS SYMPATHY FOR AUSTRIA

Vienna, Nov. 24.—A notable expression of sympathy for Austria in her present deplorable state was made by King George as England according to the Vienna "Neue Freie Presse" when Baron Frankenstein, the Austrian Ambassador presented his credentials at Buckingham Palace, London.

The King said to the Ambassador: "No one has regretted more than myself that a war should have broken out between Austria and England two countries bound by a traditional friendship. I rejoice that the friendly relations have now been re-established. I know Austria's terrible position and I am convinced that my Government will do whatever possible to help Austria."

This was in reply to the following speech by Baron Frankenstein.

"I have the honor to present to your Majesty the credentials introducing me as Austria's Ambassador to your Majesty's court. Above all it is my duty to express the thanks of the Austrian people for the generous help afforded Austria by your Majesty's Government and for the efforts of the British people to render aid to Austria in her distress. After indescribable suffering and disappointment, the Austrian people yearn to share in the spiritual and economic reconstruction of Europe. Under its present terrible conditions of life, they cannot hope to fulfill this mission. At the brink of the abyss they appeal to the powerful British Empire's traditional sense of justice, trusting that by means of speedy and far-reaching help, the road to a brighter and more hopeful future may be opened up."

U.S. HOCKEY GIRLS PRAISE BRITISH RIVALS

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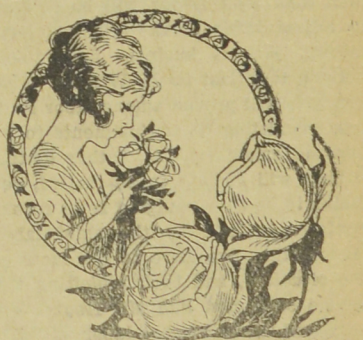

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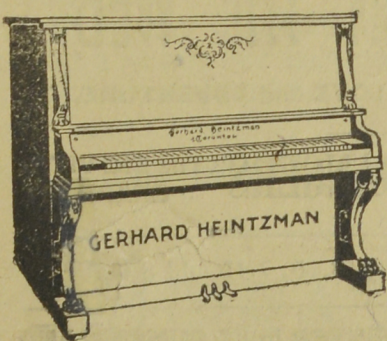
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
