OTTAWA TO BE ASKED RE THAT CRAWFORD PASS

LOCAL PEOPLE MOVING
IN THAT CONNECTION

Supporters of Meighen Government, a Dept. of Which Issued the Pass, are Interested.

The story currently reported in Fredericton that Lindsay Crawford travels on a pass over the entire Canadian National Railway system is to be investigated at Ottawa according to a statement made here by persons concerned in the demonstration on Friday, December 3rd at St. Dunstan's Hall, by which he was prevented from speaking in the interest of the Self Determination for Ireland League.

At the time of Crawford's arrival here it was reported that his pass had been seen by passengers on the C. N. R. train which brought him to Fredericton.

A supporter of the present administration at Ottawa is moving in this matter and will protest against the issue of the pass. Mr. Crawford, it is said holds it through his connection with The Statesman the weekly paper edited by him in Toronto.

It is a noticeable fact that the promoters of the demonstration against Mr. Crawford are supporters of the Meighen government which issued the railway pass to him.

DOUBLE FUNERAL MONDAY.

P. A. Logan Died in St. John This Morning—His Wife on Friday

P. A. Logan died this morning at his home, St. John after a lingering illness. Mr. Logan was well known in and about Fredericton having been employed at Gibson, as mechanical superintendent of the old Canada Eastern Railway for a period of thirty-seven years when the late Alex. Gibson Sr. was manager and owner. Thirteen years ago Mr. Logan was retired and removed to St. John where he has resided ever since. Yesterday his wife died and was to be buried here today, but the plans have been changed and there is to be a double funeral from the C. P. R. station on the arrival of the 9.55 train from St. John, Monday morning. Rev. George M. Young will conduct the service and interment will be made at the family lot in the Rural Cemetery. The late Mr. Logan has two nephews in this vicinity, Harold Logan of Devon and Edward Logan of Manguerville. Charles Logan of St. John and Hayward Logan somewhere in the West also are nephews.

Received the Mother's Cross.

Mrs. Andrew Walters of Barker's Point, today received the Mother's Cross from Ottawa. This decoration is bestowed upon those mothers whose sons have lost their lives in the Great War. Her son Private Carl G. Walters was killed Sept. 3, 1918 at Arras serving with the infantry.

HERE NEXT FRIDAY

Alexander King Tells Different Story—Says Promise to Pay Him Market Price was Not Kept.

Alexander King of Southampton who was arrested Thursday night at his home on the information of Canadian Realty Company which charged the theft of a carload of pulpwood, was before Police Magistrate Limerick Friday afternoon and was released on two thousand dollars bail. The sureties are R. B. Hanson, K. C. of this city and George Major of Southampton for \$500 each. King is for the balance himself.

The other side of the Case

The accused tells a story which puts a different appearance on the matter from that indicated by the information given by the complainant company. He states that he contracted with Canadian Realty Company to supply pulpwood at \$10.50 per cord or the market price should the price increase. The contract was made through John Moore of Springfield who acted as agent for the company. The agreement with Moore relative to the market price being paid if the price should be higher than \$10.50 per cord was verbal but King claims that his wife was present when it was made.

Held to Contract

The price of pulpwood was \$22 per cord at the time he was ready to ship the pulpwood in the winter of 1920 and he informed the company that he would not sell at \$10.50 and offered to return the money advanced to him. His offer was refused and he was told that he would be held to his contract price of \$10.50 per cord. King says that he then decided to sell to other buyers at the market price intending to reimburse Canadian Realty Company for the money advanced him. At Barony on the St. John & Quebec Railway he proceeded to load a car for Fraser Limited. John Moore who had acted as agent for Canadian Realty Company appeared and forbade the men to proceed with loading operations but they kept on saying that they did not know Moore in the transaction.

Examination on Friday

The preliminary examination of the accused will begin before Police Magistrate Limerick on Friday next. R. B. Hanson K. C., will appear for him. If he is committed an application for a jury trial will be made.

Prayed for the Reporter.
