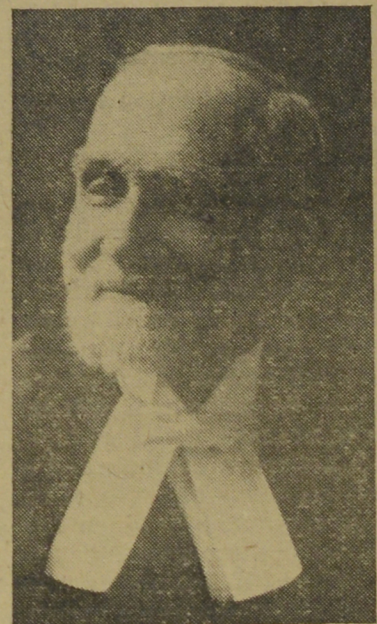

LESS DRUNK- ENNESS THAN EVER BEFORE

Magistrate Ritchie of St. John, After Thirty Years on the Bench Opposed to Sale of Wines and Beers.

Hon. R. J. Ritchie, who has served for more than thirty years as police magistrate in St. John, strongly advocates the strictest possible form of prohibition. In an interview given this week, he says:

"You cannot quote me too strongly as in favor of prohibition. This means that I am opposed to the sale of even light wines and beers which, if permitted, would defeat prohibition. My desire is that we should retain the

present law and go on from this to something better. Notwithstanding assertions to the contrary, I know that there is less drinking and less drunkenness and that conditions are infinitely better than in pre-prohibition days. Under the old law I instructed the police to assist a man if he were not too drunk, but now every one showing the slightest indication of having been drinking must be brought before me. Even so, the arrests have been fewer."

earned the additional designation of "bootlegger."

James S. Shevlin supervising agent of internal revenue poured another thrill into the cocktail which has given the fast society set of New York its greatest sensation since the Thaw case. He announced that Wall street men seem to be implicated in the bootlegging ring of which Elwell is now reported to have been a member. Shevlin came into the case on his own initiative to run down a \$120,000 shipment of liquor which Elwell is said to have ordered only to dishonor his own check.

Now Shevlin's investigators have uncovered evidence which he is confident will indicate a motive for the Elwell murder and which might point to the murderer.

Prohibition agents, suspecting that Elwell's valet, William Barnes, had not told all he knew, pinned Barnes down with direct questions after cautioning him against the consequences of perjury. Barnes' subsequent answers amounted to "squealing" on other men who he said would know about the liquor deals. Barnes admitted that liquor had been bought for the exclusive and aristocratic Studio club, of which he is steward.

And he is said to have told Shevlin, that he personally followed a truck about New York's streets while it delivered many barrels of gin to about eight addresses. Barnes said he bought the liquor through Roy East-

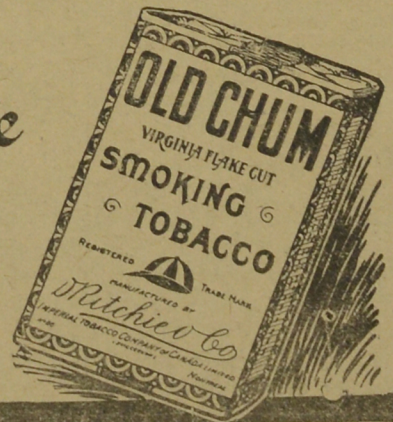
