FOUR WAR COOTIES SOLD TO A MUSEUM IN AMERICA FOR \$800

Plantville, Dec. 7.—One of the queerest relics of the war that brought a remarkable price the other day was a collection of four cooties, which sold for \$800. Ex-doughboys will profess that the collector who sold them profiteered. Not so, because as you will learn the man who made the collection earned his money.

There were four of the pests, similar to those that caused every man hunting soldier of the A. E. F. practice in their nightly killings. There was a French cootie, a Belgian cootie, one of a British breed and then an alien cootie—a German coot. Yes, there's all the difference in the world in the cooties of the different armies. Anyhow, each of the four cooties was affixed to a piece of paper by candle grease that hardened, and today, owing to the transparency of the candle grease the cooties are plainly visible.

An Under Fire Collection.

John Connolly of Plantville had an idea; a gem of an idea at that, because today he has handed down to posterity the only collection made on the battlefield under fire of the coot-

ie. He had no premonition of the profit he would realize. He had no idea his collection would shortly find its way to the American Museum of Natural History as the only collection of its kind in the world, because that's where the collection headed for. The purchaser, who refuses to reveal his name at present, intends to make the presentation. John didn't realize all this when he started his collection in the spring of 1918.

He was in France with a truck train that carried ammunition from a munitions dump up to the front. So in writing home to an inquiring friend in the United States who wanted to know what cooties were John thought it would be best to send him one. len thread which made the shirt was fifty miles long. (A manufacturer tells us so).

BRAGE HAS MADE TRACK HISTORY IN M.P.

Fine Trotter From the Edwards Stable at Halifax Goes to the States—His History.

James W. Power in the Acadian Recorder of Halifax comments upon the sale of "Bob" Edwards' trotter Brage to an American party and gives the following sketch:

Word was received today from Lyman Rusie representing R. H. DeLaford of Brook Farm, Chester, N. Y., accepting the terms asked for the Halifax trotter Brage, 2.11½. The price is private, but it can be said it was an excellent one.

Brage, like Bill Sharen, is a provincial bred, being sired by Baring, 2.12¼ dam Jessie Rampart, by Rampart both owned by R. H. Edwards. Brage who was foaled in Halifax in 1912 was developed trained and driven by Frank Boutillier, and a brief summary of the history of the horse speaks in plain but eloquent terms of the success he has achieved with him.

Brage was the champion two year old of 1914; he lowered the three-year old trotting record for the Provinces to 2.20¼ in 1915; he lowered the four year old stallion record for the Provinces to 2.18¼ in 1916; two years later he trotted in 2.16¼, then the fastest mile by a trotting stallion bred in the Maritime Provinces; last year he still further lowered that record to 2.11½, sharing the honors with Bill Sharen in the fastest four heat race ever trotted in the Provinces, 2.11½, 2.11¼, 2.11¼, 2.12½.

The sale of Brage, following that of Bill Sharen shows that the class of horses being bred in the Provinces are attracting the attention of the most prominent turfmen in America.

Brage will be shipped to his new home Thursday. He is a handsome brown stallion a beautifully gaired trotter and he will be much missed about the Maritime tracks he being a great favorite with turf followers.

This is the second trotter sold by Mr. R. H. Edwards to American parties for a large sum, Walter Cox having some years ago bought Baring (the sire of Brage) from him for \$4,500.

"Standing pat on the theory that our town is no worse than some other town," remarked the Man on the Car, "is one way to let our town grow worse and more of it."

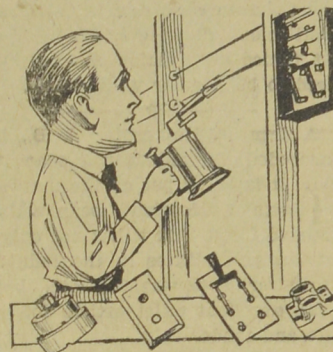
