## IPULPW00D THEFT CHARGED AGAINST MAN

Contracted for by Canadian Realty Company to Another Firm.

Unusual Case.

The case is an unusual one but is of interest as it concerns pulpwood which in recent years has become one of the most important products of New Brunswick. The theft according to the information consisted in selling a carload of pulpwood contracted for by Canadian Realty Company to Frasers Limited. The purchase was made by the latter firm in good faith.

The Circumstances.

The circumstances as alleged are that in the spring of 1919 King contracted with Canadian Realty Company for the sale and delivery of pulpwood. The latter was to be cut and peeled in the summer of 1919 and de-ivery was to be made in the winter of Maugerville. It is believed that are low of Maugerville. Officers Elected by Agricul- Shipped Carload of Pulpwood Again to Try to Have American Coal Withheld from Canada -The Pulpwood Question.

Alexander King of Queensbury was arrested at his home last night by Constable Charles Barker on the charge of theft, Canadian Realty Company being the complainant. The actused was brought to Fredericton by motor and was placed in York County jail. This afternoon he appeared before Police Magistrate Limerick and was remanded in order to give time to produce witnesses.

Unusual Case.

Advices received in this city from those closely identified with the International Paper Company, are to the effect that that powerful organization is about to make another attempt to have the United States Congress pass another measure to withhold American coal for Canada unless alteration is made in the provincial regulations of various Canadian provinces, by which pulpwood cut on Crown Lands cannot be exported.

Last Measure Vetoed

The last measure of that nature was vetoed by President Wilson. It is believed that with a Republican Congress and Republican president, the measure if passed again will be allowed to stand.

Important to this Province The contemplated action is of interest in New Prunswick as a consid erable quantity of pulpwood is cut on Crown Land and if the export regulation should be removed the cut would be increased. The regulation is to encourage manufacturing in Canada in stead of sending raw material to the United States. Pulpwood from private lands is not regulated.
