SYNOD COMPLETED ITS BUSINESS IN RECORD TIME

Committee Meetings Today All That Was Left—Proposal for Increased Stipends for the Clergy—Various Reports Received and Dealt With—Next Annual Meeting to be Held at St. John on Third Tuesday After Easter.

The Anglican Synod of the Diocese of Fredericton completed its business yesterday with the exception of some committee work this morning. The celerity with which the business was despatched was not surpassed in twenty years. A considerable variety of business was transacted.

Afternoon Session
The afternoon session of the Synod began at 3:02 o'clock. The Boards and Committees of the Synod for 1920 were elected.

Rothsaway Collegiate School
The report of the Board of Education was read, as well as the report of the Head Master of Rothsaway Collegiate School by H. F. Puddington. of St. John. That of W. R. Hibbard the head master touched on the erection of a memorial in the form of a Chapel for which already \$9,000 has been collected. There were eighty-four students enrolled, of whom eighty-one were in residence.

A balance on hand of \$120.59 was shown by the financial report. The report of the Board of Finance was read by A. C. Skelton. The sum of \$22,630 has been received in cash and investments to the amount of \$51,300 have been made.

Home For Girls

The report of the Synod representation on the Maritime Home for Girls by Mr. Fawcett. The Home is filled, there being forty nine inmates of whom thirteen belong to the Church of England. Steps must be taken shortly to enlarge it or provide another building.

The report by the standing committee on the Bishop's charge was adopted as a whole after considering it section by section. It was read by Very Rev. Dean Neales.

Night Session

The meeting continued at 8 p. m. Rev. Mr. Baxter moved "That this meeting of the Diocesan Synod has received with much pleasure the report of the Women's Auxiliary and its appreciation of the work done in the Forward Movement." This resolution was passed.

Church Union

Mr. Smith moved that the matter of church union be taken up and that this Synod believes in and indorses the principle of the union of Christendom, or all Christian denominations of religion.

Forward Movement

Rev. Canon Armstrong of St. John read the figures of the Forward Movement to date. For the Province: Total amount promised \$130,656.56; Total amount paid in \$55,329.11.

Of this about \$50,000 will come back to the Diocese, contingent, of course, upon its being all sent in. The hearty thanks of the Synod, on motion of Archdeacon Newnam and seconded by Rev. Dean Neales, were extended to Venerable Archdeacon Crowfoot and Canon Armstrong for their work in the financial side of the Forward Movement.

In this motion were also included Miss Robinson Scovil, the women of the Diocese as a whole and Canon Smithers.

For Rural Deaneries

Rev. E. Hailstone moved an amendment to Canon 18 Section 1, by the insertion of the words "the Rural Deaneries", after the words "the Archdeacons." After much discussion it was decided that this matter be taken up by the Rural Deaneries and the motion was not allowed.

Forward Movement Funds

J. H. A. L. Fairweather, the Treasurer of the Synod, asked that arrangements be made for year 1921, for the disposal of the income of the Forward Movement.

He moved that the money received be invested and the income received be deposited to the credit of the Board of Missions for that work. Canon Kuhring suggested that the superannuated men be considered and their pension of \$400 per year possibly augmented.

Dr. Teeds idea was that the money should be kept separate and used either for widows and orphans, incapacitated clergymen or acting clergymen.

The money is to be placed to the credit of the executive committee. With these amendments the motion was passed.

Increased Stipends

The matter of increased stipends was discussed. Mr. Fairweather, the Treasurer, moved as follows: That the minimum stipend of the clergy of the Diocese during diocese be \$1,100.

That the stipend of priests during the first five years of service as such be \$1,200 with a residence or \$1,300 if there be no residence provided.

That after five years of service the stipend shall be \$1,300 with a residence, or \$1,400 if there be no residence provided.

That this increase go into effect on January 1st, 1921. Horace A. Porter seconded the motion. A resolution stating that \$200 be allowed to clergy men who used a horse or automobile was passed, embodied with this and the whole was with a provision regarding railroad fares, etc.

Both clergy and laymen were unanimous in their desire for the raising of the stipends of the clergymen and particularly advocated the education of the farmer parishioners in giving more freely.

Defended Farmers

The lay delegate from New Denmark rose in defence of the farmer and ably showed that the farmer's life is not nor has not been in the past all milk and honey. He drew interesting reminiscences from the times when potatoes were 40 cents per barrel. At the same time he supported the policy of increased giving.

Church History

Dr. W. S. Carter moved a resolution that a committee of three be appointed who have an aptitude and a liking for that sort of thing to approach Dr. W. O. Raymond regarding the writing of a manuscript on Church history and the history of noted churchmen. The gratitude of the Synod was expressed in the resolution which was passed. An appreciation is to be drafted and communicated to the Doctor expressing appreciation and sympathy in his work.

Press Work

The matter of Church news in the Saturday morning issue of the St. John Telegraph was taken up and thoroughly discussed. The value of the publicity is appreciated and further steps are to be taken to get news matter into the press.

Next Meeting

Dr. Walker moved that the next place of meeting be the city of St. John. Carried.

It was moved that the date be the third Tuesday after Easter by Dean Neales. Carried.

Votes of Thanks

A hearty vote of thanks of the Synod to the Y. M. C. A. was tendered. It was also carried. It was moved that the salaries of the Secretary and Treasurer be referred to the Executive Committee with power to act.

Dr. Carter tendered a very hearty vote of thanks to Bishop Richardson for the manner in which he had presided at the Synod. Venerable Archdeacon Crowfoot seconded this motion. This was carried unanimously, and Dean Neales delivered in a few words the vote of thanks of the Synod to which His Lordship suitably replied.

A Medical Bill

A bill to amend the Act incorporating the Council of Physicians was considered by the Law Committee of the House this morning. A delegation of physicians was heard and Drs. Spangler and Dakin who practice osteopathy were also heard. The bill proposed to recognize the practice of osteopathy. It was agreed to by the Committee.
