FINAL SESSION OF LABOR FEDERATION ON FRIDAY

The New Brunswick Federation of Labor concluded its annual meeting here Friday afternoon. Officers were elected. C. A. Melanson, of Moncton, again being chosen president.

Before the Federation rose a resolution endorsing organization among farmers was passed. This previously had been tabled after discussion.

Many resolutions were passed and a report received from the delegation which went before the Provincial Government.

At Friday forenoon's session a resolution of condolence with Past Vice-president and Mrs. Frank Lister on the loss of their daughter was adopted.

The Federation resumed at 2.30 in the afternoon. The publication of the Union Worker by A. D. Colwell in St. John was approved and recommended to the favorable consideration of labor.

President Melanson reported from the interview with the government.

On the matter of ways and means the usual grants were made. Per capita was left at six cents, payable semi-annually. The motion to raise per capita to ten cents was defeated. The length of the next convention was left to the executive.

Constitution Committee.

The constitution committee reported as follows:

1. Per capita tax to be payable semi-annually.

2. Officers to consist of president, secretary-treasurer, two vice-presidents at large, these four to be the executive and one vice-president from each city and county represented.

3. Secretary-treasurer to be bonded for five hundred dollars.

These were adopted as a whole.

The Federal government was asked to continue public employment bureaus.

The following resolution was pre-

sented on behalf of the Miramichi delegation, by J. E. Tighe, and adopted:

"Whereas the Provincial Government has under consideration the development of water powers in the province of New Brunswick, and whereas the development of such powers on the Miramichi and other waters would create extra industries, and lessen the rate for heating and lighting to consumers;

"Therefore resolved, that the N. B. Federation of Labor go on record as requesting the Provincial Government to put into operation in the Miramichi and other districts at the earliest opportunity, the development of such water power under government ownership."

C. Gus Langbien, of St. John, was elected to serve on the proposed Dominion commission to co-ordinate and unify labor laws.

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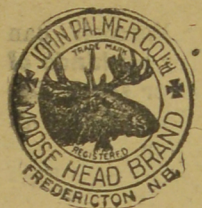
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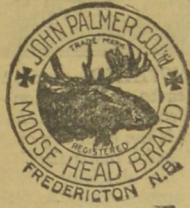
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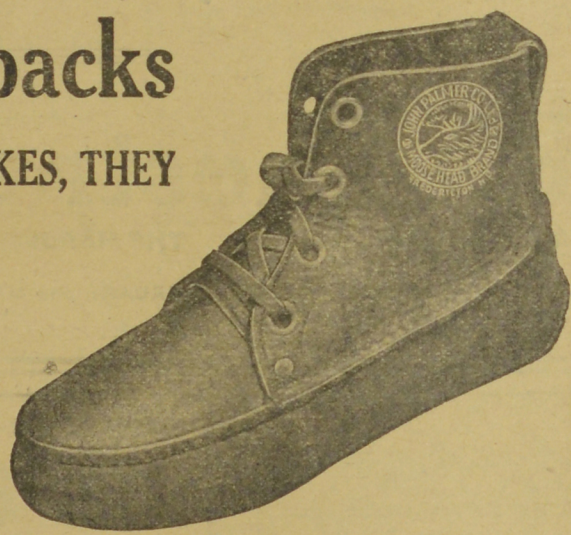
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gation, asked for licensing of motor vehicle drivers, two operators for a street car, prohibition of the export of pulpwood, new stationary engineers act, putting factory act under the Compensation Board, total disability cases pensioned for life, increased permanent partial disability pension from \$1,500 to \$2,500, full medical and nursing attendance, widows' and orphans' allowance increased to \$30 and \$7.50 and other amendments to the Compensation Act.

Other Matters.

Eugene R. Steeves asked for an eight hour day in all industries, facilities for absent voters, the fair rent act and an additional legislative representative for Moncton.

B. Kennedy advocated a mining law to protect owners.

W. J. MacNeil asked for free school books and supplies.

J. S. Martin asked for water power development

H. H. Stuart presented the Federation's request for a government minimum living wage for each class of school teachers, also consolidation of small districts wherever practicable, widows' pensions as in Manitoba, the abolition of all property qualifications for offices of mayor, alderman and county councillor, and proportional representation in elections to the legislature.

Geo. R. Melvin asked for minimum wages for women and children, laws governing cold storage, licensing of plumbers, training for motormen, the union label on government printing, the fair wage act, etc.

C. A. Melanson asked for a labor minister and labor bureau.

Striking machinists in St. John received a resolution of sympathy.

A motion was adopted expressing pleasure at the organization going on among farmers.
