Q. 1. What was the total cost of building the Smith Brook Bridge in the Parish of Prince William, County of York?

Ans. \$586.18.

Q. 2. Who was the foreman that had charge of the work?

Ans. Albert F. Smith.

Q. 3. What experience did he have in bridge building?

Ans. The Department has no knowledge of his previous experience, but the structural superintendent considered him as a practical man who understood the work and, as foreman and builder in connection with the above mentioned bridge, he was quite satisfied with his workmanship.

Q. 4. How many days did he work and at what rate per day?

Q. 5. Who were the other men employed on this work?

Q. 6. How many days did each work and at what rate per day?

Q. 7. Who were the men employed with teams?

Q. 8. How many days did each work at what rate per day?

Q. 9. What amount of lumber was used in the construction of said Bridge and the price per thousand feet?

Ans. The information asked for in the questions 4 to 9 inclusive, are contained in the copies of the payrolls submitted herewith.

HON. MR. VENIOT in reply to Mr. Smith, (Carleton).

Q. 1. What was the amount paid to the contractors for the building or Salmon River Mouth Bridge, Parish of Alma, County of Albert, up to the 31st day of October last, and has any amount been paid to them since that date?

A. The amount paid the contractors of Salmon River Mouth Bridge up to October 31st, 1919 was \$35,322.50. Since that time the amount paid to them was \$655.14.

Q. 2. What is the amount now held by the Government for the final completion of the work?

A. \$1,727.40.

Q. 3. Were all the clauses in the plans and specifications complied with in constructing this referred to work?

A. The original plans and specifications were adhered to except in the case of a temporary ferry, this was cancelled and a temporary bridge erected.

Q. 4. Has the material for the second completion of the work been delivered?

A. Yes.

Q. 5. Who was the Inspector of the above referred to work?

A. Mr. N. Dexter Connor.

Q. 6. Was he paid by commission or day's work, and what was the amount paid in either case?

A. Mr. Connor was paid by day's work and the amount paid him was \$576.00.
