

## STANLEY CASE HEARD IN POLICE COURT HERE

WARRANT SERVED ON  
CHARGE MADE LAST FALL

Offender Acknowledged Destruction of Property and Civil Debt—Denied Other Charges.

John Merrill of Stanley appeared in the police court here this morning on the charge of causing destruction of property and using obscene language in public and also on a capias for a debt. He acknowledged causing destruction of property and owing the debt but pleaded not guilty to using obscene language.

The incident which caused Merrill's arrest on a warrant by Constable Charles Barker, occurred at a public entertainment in the Orange Hall, Stanley, last autumn. The accused made a disturbance and kicked a stove over. The allegation that he used obscene language was made at the same time.

A warrant was sworn out for him at that time but he left the place and his arrest could not be made until recently.

The young man served overseas and some members of the G. W. V. A. interested themselves in his case this morning. They expressed the opinion that he should not be under arrest. This made no difference however, and his case came up in the usual way. The charge of using indecent language was heard this afternoon.

## INTERESTING ADDRESSES AT F. & D. MEETING

HON. P. J. VENIOT TALKED  
UPON HIGHWAY MATTERS

Minister Given Excellent Reception—J. D. McKenna, of Sussex Dealt with Co-operation.

The meeting of the N. B. Farmers' and Dairymen's Association opened at 9.15 this morning. The Association was addressed by the President for a short time and G. R. Wilson then took the platform addressing the representatives on the subject of "Marketing Eggs and Fowl."

Hon. P. J. Veniot

At 10 o'clock Hon. P. J. Veniot Minister of Public Works gave the men a great talk on the subject of "Roads and Highways." He pointed out that New Brunswick was the only province in the Dominion where the Provincial Government looked entirely after its own highways throughout the country districts and did not apply to municipalities for capital to assist.

Hon. Mr. Veniot was given an attentive hearing and was heartily applauded. His reception by members of the Association indicated that the vast improvement in the highways of New Brunswick brought about under the leadership of Hon. Mr. Veniot is greatly appreciated in the country districts.

J. D. McKenna

J. D. McKenna of Sussex secretary of the N. B. Agricultural Societies United whose subject was "Cooperation" was the next speaker. He spoke chiefly of the increased cost of the different fertilizers during the last year. The fertilizers have increased approximately 25 per cent in the last year and it is almost impossible to import them from Germany and Holland where the larger quantities are obtained.
