**VELVET BLOUSES FOR WINTER**

For cold weather wear a good deal of confidence is expressed in the popularity of chiffon velvet blouses. Just at present this blouse is being used more as a window decoration than anything else, but the fabric certainly makes up into an effective garment and when worn with a satin or lace separate skirt a decidedly becoming afternoon frock is usually the result.

**CARE OF THE HANDS.**

The every-day care of normally nice hands is not a difficult or lengthy procedure. The hand should be exercised about ten minutes daily. Little piano-like exercises of the fingers will keep them supple and the circulation good. Then twice or three times a week the hand should be really massaged with a good massage cream. The massaging should be done from finger-tip to wrist with a firm, steady rubbing motion.

Water and soap and steam heat make the skin unnaturally dry. In this condition it cracks and wrinkles more easily and picks up dirt more readily. Therefore, after each bathing the hands should be rubbed with a good lotion to soften the skin. If the hand is unusually dry, the lotion should be used every night before retiring and worn to bed under a soft old glove.

**PRUNED APPLES.**

Wash and soak 1/2 pound of prunes several hours in cold water, then drain off the water and put it into a saucepan with 1/2 cup of sugar; let it boil two or three minutes. Pare four apples and remove their cores; place them in the hot prune syrup and let them cook until tender. Then gently remove them to individual plates (this recipe is for four portions) and put the prunes into the hot syrup, letting them also cook until tender. When the prunes are tender, remove their stones and pack them very carefully into the hole left in the apple by the removal of the cores. Pour the hot syrup over all. Let cool then chill on ice. Serve topped with whipped cream.

**RAISINED APPLES.**

Wash, core and remove the pulp from six apples, leaving a good shell to hold the following stuffing: Put one cup of raw apples through a food chopper, also one cup of seedless raisins and 1/2 tablespoon of lemon juice. Stuff apples with this mixture and place them on a greased baking tin. Now make a syrup in a saucepan of one cup of water, one cup sugar and 1/2 tablespoon of butter; bring this to the boiling point, let boil for three or four minutes, then pour it over the apples in the baking pan. Place the baking tin in the oven (a moderate oven) and let bake for about 20 minutes. Serve either hot or cold. If served, cold, chill and top with whipped cream.
