CHRISTIAN SCIENTISTS ARE INDULGING IN DISPUTES

Special Committee of Illinois Conference Wants the Removal of the Trustees of the Christian Science Publishing Society Hearing in the United States Supreme Court—Injunctions Secured in Massachusetts.

Boston, May 8.—That a special committee appointed by a conference of Christian Science churches in Illinois is in this state urging Atty. Gen. J. Weston Allen to bring suit for the removal of the trustees of the Christian Science Publishing Society was part of the evidence introduced at the Christian Science hearing in the Supreme Court before Judge Pierce.

The hearing was on the petition of Sherman L. Whipple counsel for the trustees of the Publishing Society to extend the temporary injunction issued against a group of Greater Boston Scientists restraining them from interfering with the business of the society so as to include Frederick A. Hemingway assistant chairman of the Illinois Science Emergency Committee, and Arthur T. Fosberry of San Francisco. Mr. Whipple seeks to have these men added to the list of defendants named in his bill, charging the so-called Harney group with conspiracy to injure the society's business.

After the noon recess, the hearing was adjourned until May 24, when the bill against the Harney group and the question of including the Illinois and California men as defendants will be considered together.

Mr. Bangs was called to the witness stand by William A. Morse, who with Frederick H. Chase, ex-judge of the Superior Court, is counsel for Mr. Bangs and Mr. Hemingway. Mr. Morse declared that his clients came to Massachusetts to consult with the Attorney General as to what measures might be taken to settle the disputes and that they had been treated by the trustees like conspirators and "dragged into court without warning."

"Led by Prayer," Mr. Bangs Says
Mr. Bangs testified that in March at a meeting of members of the Fifteenth Church of Christ, Scientist, in Chicago, of which he is a member, he told those present that he had been "led by prayer to cancel his subscriptions to the publications" of the Publishing Society, and would not renew them until new trustees had been appointed.

The witness said that at a later conference of Illinois churches of which he was chairman, resolutions were offered declaring that the trustees had been recreant of their trust and should resign, and that since it was of paramount importance that the Manual be upheld, an emergency committee be appointed to request the Attorney General of Massachusetts to bring action to remove the trustees. It further recommended that all Scientists cancel subscriptions to all but a few specified publications.

Mr. Bangs stated that the directors of the Mother Church had nothing to do with these resolutions and he himself did not vote for them.

Under cross-examination by Mr. Whipple, Mr. Bangs admitted that he was in Boston on March 24, 1919, the day before the filing of the trustees' suit against the directors, that he consulted with the directors in regard to

the local situation that the directors had asked him to come to Boston and that they paid his expenses. He also admitted conferences with the directors on March 25, 26, and 27.

Mr. Bangs stated that he had been paid \$250 for a young man who, at the request of Judge Clifford P. Smith, chairman of the publication committee and one of the directors' counsel had investigated trustee Lamont Rowlands.

Mr. Bangs said that he had acted for the directors in connection with a will case and had served as an attorney for the Illinois publication committee. He admitted that there had been objection to his election as chairman of the emergency committee on the ground that he was an attorney for the directors.

Charles F. Choate Jr. of Boston, who appeared as counsel for Mr. Fosberry declared that people could not be enjoined from refusing to read publications in which they no longer believe.

Judge States Question.

Judge Pierce said that he agreed that any member had a right to refuse to read any publication but that he did not agree that any man had a right to advise others not to read them for the purpose of destroying the Publishing Society or causing the resignation of the trustees. He stated the question is whether the defendants had done things which if continued might lead to the loss of the court's power to settle the controversy.

"These gentlemen are going about boasting 'We may make the judgment of the Massachusetts courts a nullity and its decision a futile thing. We may do what the directors cannot do,' said Mr. Whipple. 'There is a great deal to be said about freedom of speech and obedience to the Manual, but should not something be said about obedience to law?'"

TRIAL EVENT AT ST. JOHN

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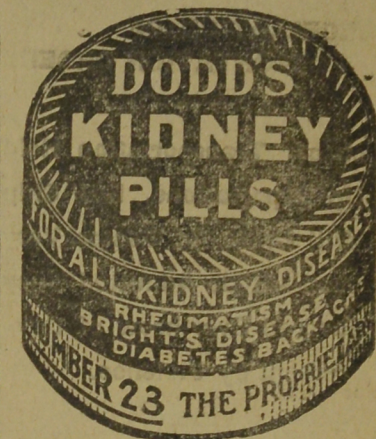
